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CENTRAL ILLINOIS DAIRY SHOW

Saturday, August 7, is a big day for farmers in this section of Central Illinois. It is the day that the dairy farmers stage their second annual dairy cattle show in Sullivan. Sponsors of the show have provided cash premiums totalling \$2,070. This substantial sum ranks the show as one of the top affairs as far as prize money is concerned. In quality of stock exhibited the show will rank at or near the top also.

Six breeds of dairy cattle are to be shown—Holstein, Guernsey, Jersey, Brown Swiss, Milking Shorthorn and Red Poll. All of these types of dairy producers are popular in this locality and entry lists will be well filled. There is sure to be high interest.

Last year's show attracted some very fine cattle, although it had only a short period of promotion. A better show is in prospect this year, and the prestige of the event may be expected to grow with each year of continuance.

G. I. INSURANCE

Veterans of World War II have just two days in which to reinstate their G. I. insurance, without a physical examination, if they have let it lapse. At this late date it is doubtful if many will take advantage of the generous offer extended by the government, despite the urging by service officers and veterans organizations that they do so.

After the July 31 deadline veterans wishing to reinstate G. I. insurance will have to take a physical examination. Until that date all they have to do is to certify that they are in health as good as it was the day the policy lapsed. The insurance issued to veterans is good insurance and is recommended by insurance experts as one of the lowest cost policies available today.

Veterans who are eligible for this insurance, and have let their policies lapse, will have to act quickly if they desire reinstatement with a minimum of time and effort. Saturday is the last day without taking a physical examination. That opportunity may not occur again.

FARM PRODUCTION FOR MOULTRIE COUNTY

America's agriculture production during World War II and since was accomplished largely by less than a third of the nation's 5.9 million farms with a third of the farm population. This is shown in a Department of Agriculture study of farm by total value of production. The survey breaks down farms into seven broad classifications, from large-scale operations such as cattle ranches down to groups classed as nominal units, representing residential homes with a small area of grounds, or places where elderly farmers have retired.

The study shows that approximately 1.7 million farms, representing 29 percent of the total number of farms, turned out 76 percent of the total gross value of farm production in 1945. The group that had the biggest production is the medium family farm. There were approximately 1.2 million of these in 1945 with a population of around 5 1/2 million, or nearly a fifth of the total farm population. They raised 30 percent of the total gross value of farm production.

Next to these came the group classed as large family farms. These farms had 10 per cent of the total farm population, and contributed 24 percent of the total gross value of farm production.

Large scale farming operation comes next, with figures showing they produced 22 percent of the gross value of farm production in 1945.

Other groupings contribute only a small percentage. From descriptions of the classifications one must construe that Moultrie county farms fall mainly into the small family and large family classifications—the main-stays in the production of food and fiber for the nation.
