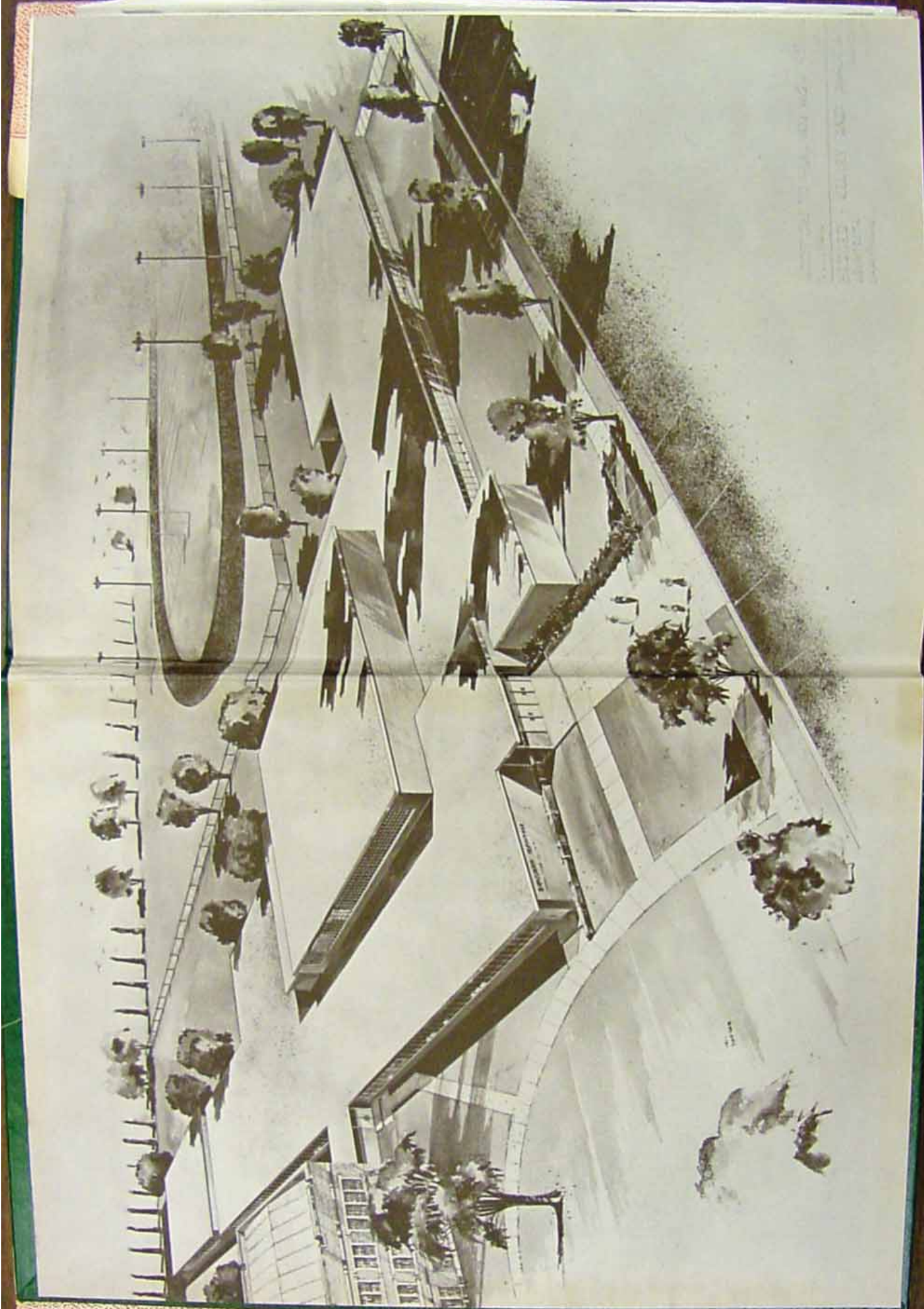

Study hall was not only a place to study; it was also a place to read a good book, to build a day dream, or perhaps to talk to that "certain someone" before school or at noon.

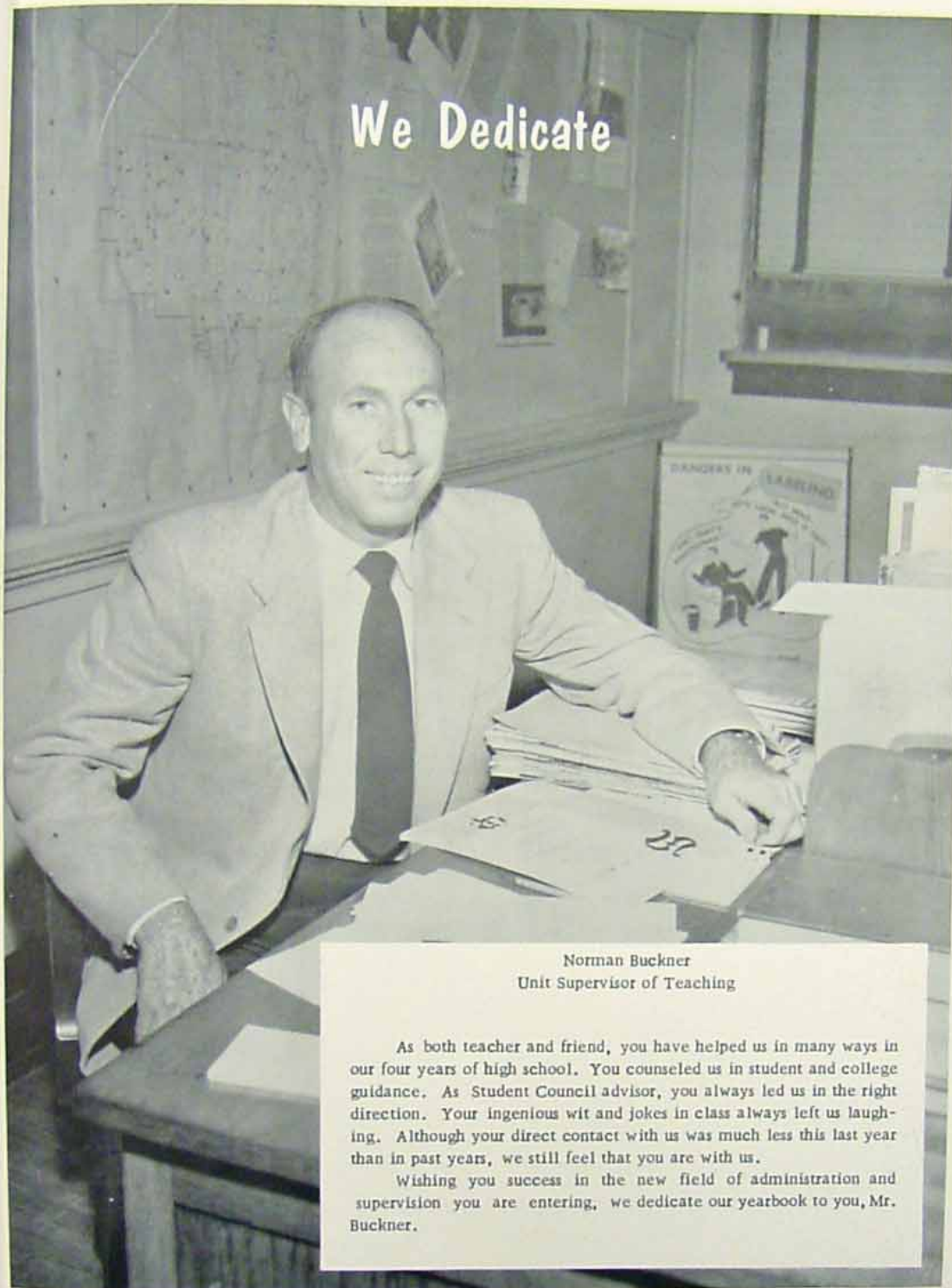
As years go by, scenes in the new building, which is shown under construction in the picture below, will gradually become as much an accepted part of school life as check-out from study hall has been for us.

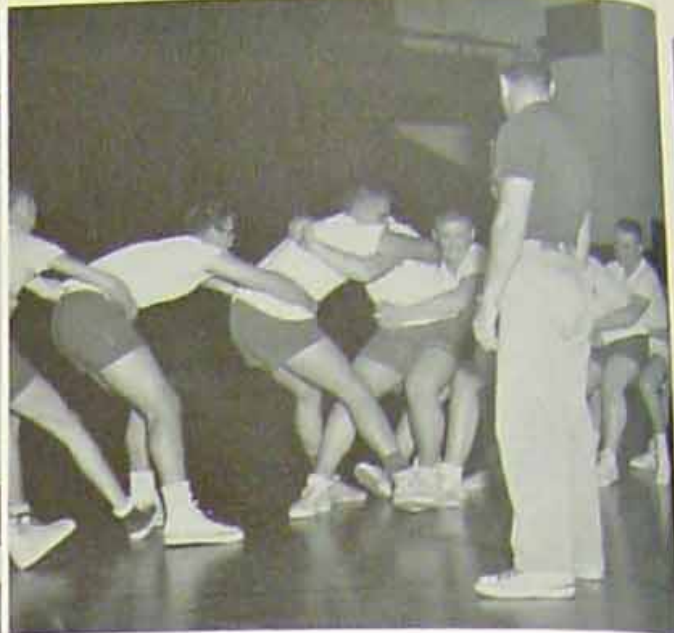

Two subjects, English II, complete with JULIUS CAESAR, and biology, involving scalpel and dissecting pan, are required the second year at S.H.S. Choosing two electives proves difficult for the sophomore who has not yet determined his life's work.

If he has taken Agriculture I or Homemaking I, the question arises, "Shall I continue my education in this field?" The freshman subject, French I, is not complete without a sophomore course in French II.

## Juniors Settle Significant Selections,

When a student reaches the junior level, the elective subjects he selects are doubly significant. The junior faces a most important decision, whether or not to remain in school. The majority, who decide to get their diploma, realize the seriousness of choosing courses of study which will best prepare them for chosen professions.

Advanced algebra, introducing logarithms, and chemistry, introducing laboratory experiments, prepare the student for a career in engineering, nursing, or medicine. Secretarial foundations are Office Practice I, a three-period, two-credit subject, and Bookkeeping I. Ec-

onomics, a study of financial affairs, is a necessary background for banking or accounting. Agriculture III projects and programs provide farming experience; home economics students construct dresses and suits as well as careers.

Juniors increase their understanding of our country's past in one required subject, American history; while the other, English III, stresses United States literature. Clubs, rings, magazine sales, spring prom, and Junior Carnival combine to make the third year at Sullivan High School the busiest, most profitable, and most pleasant year so far.

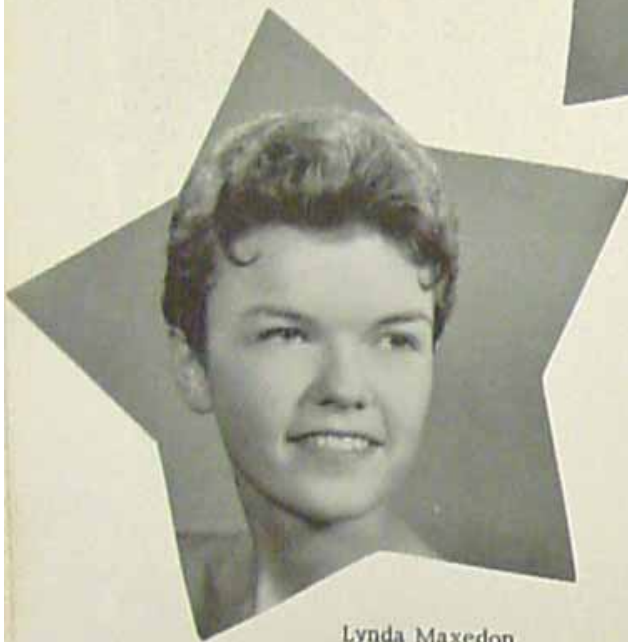

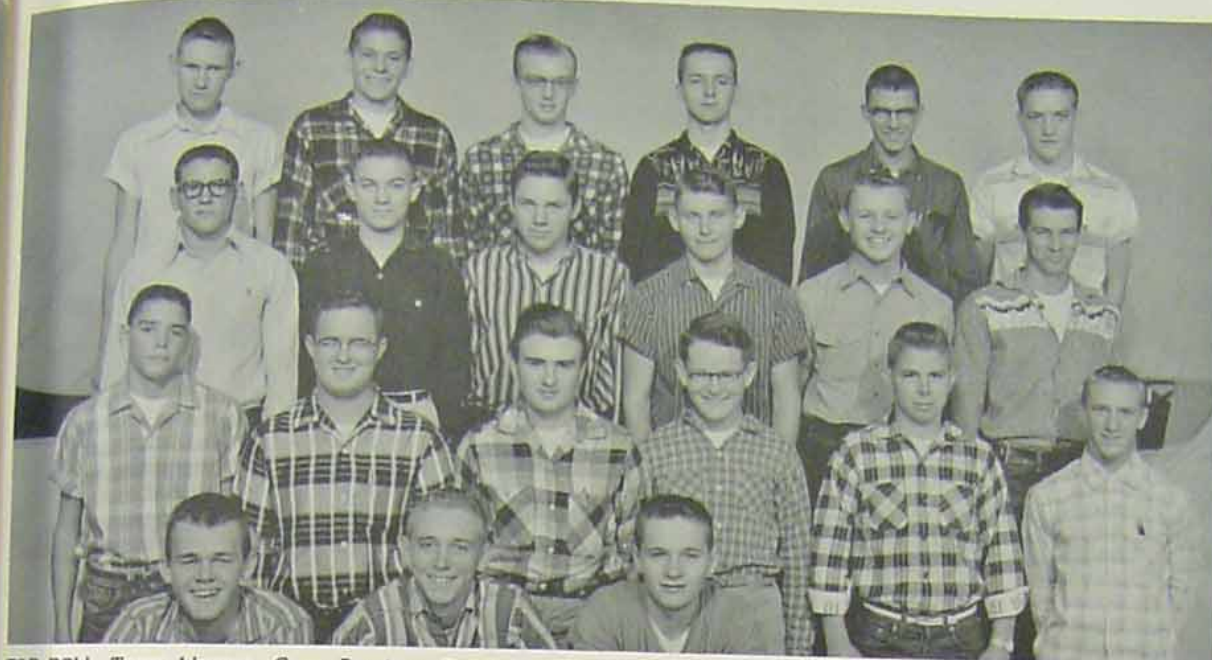

## Boys' Athletic Association Newest

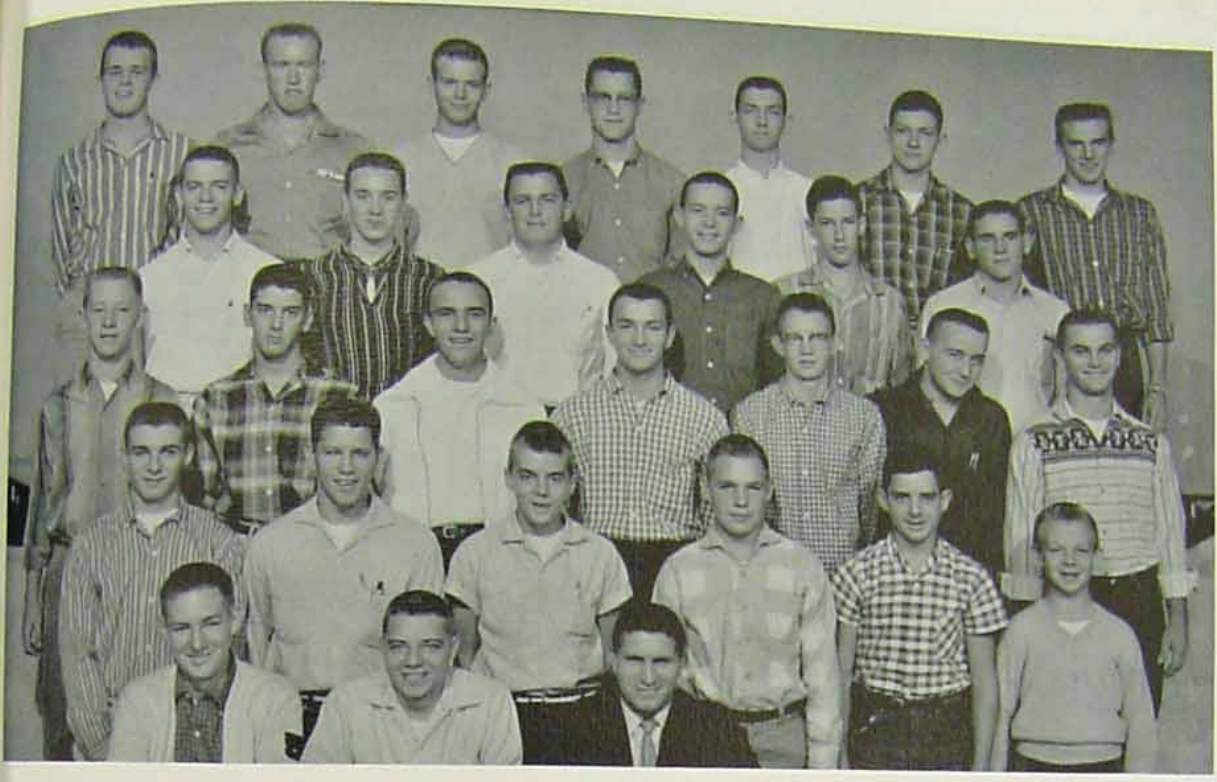

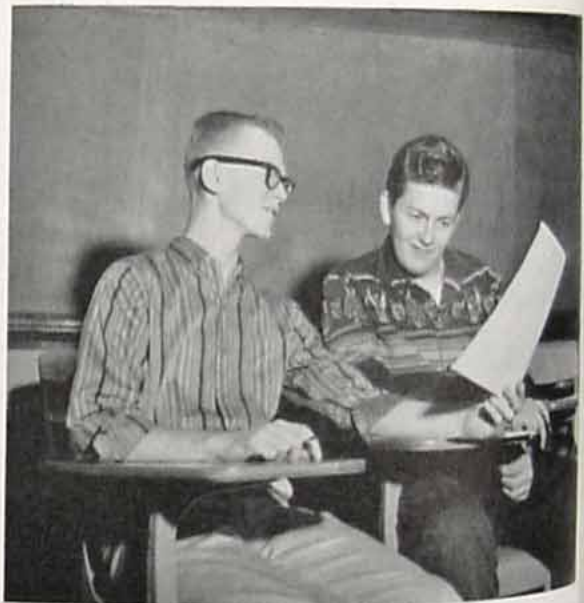
## Journalism Lays Foundations Beneath

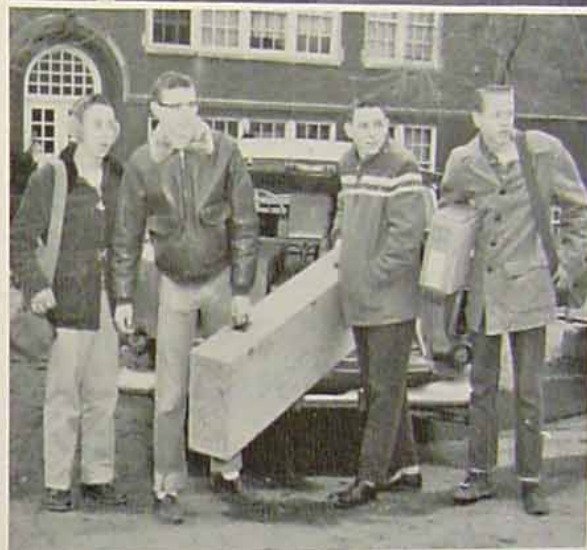


## Activities Of RETROSPECT Construction

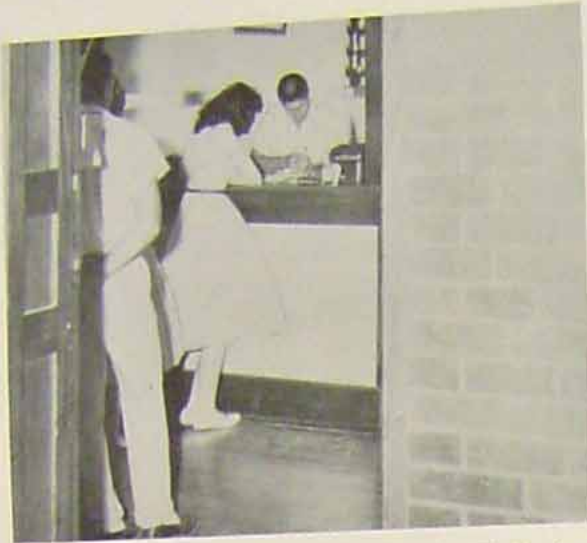

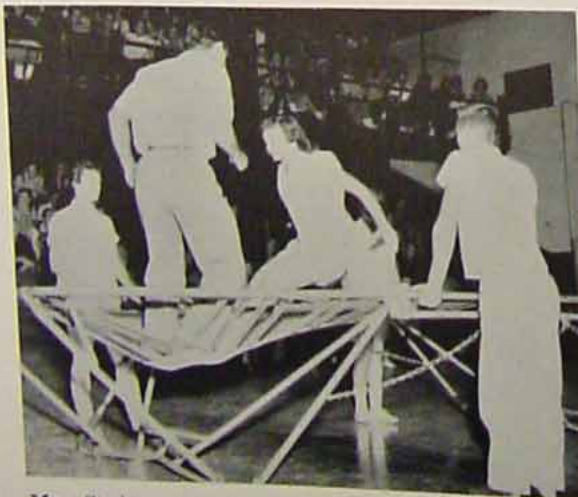

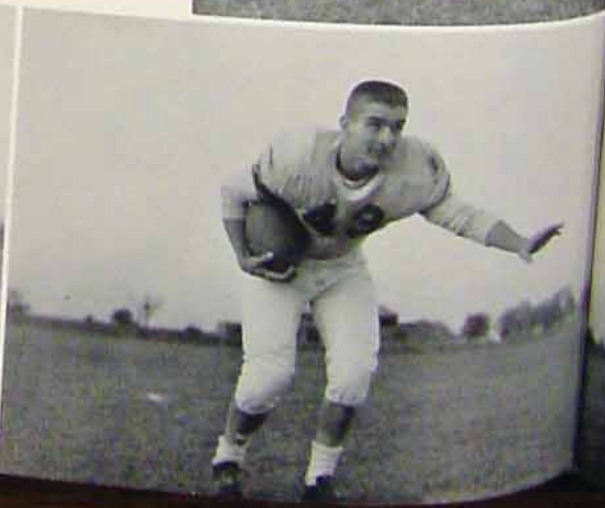

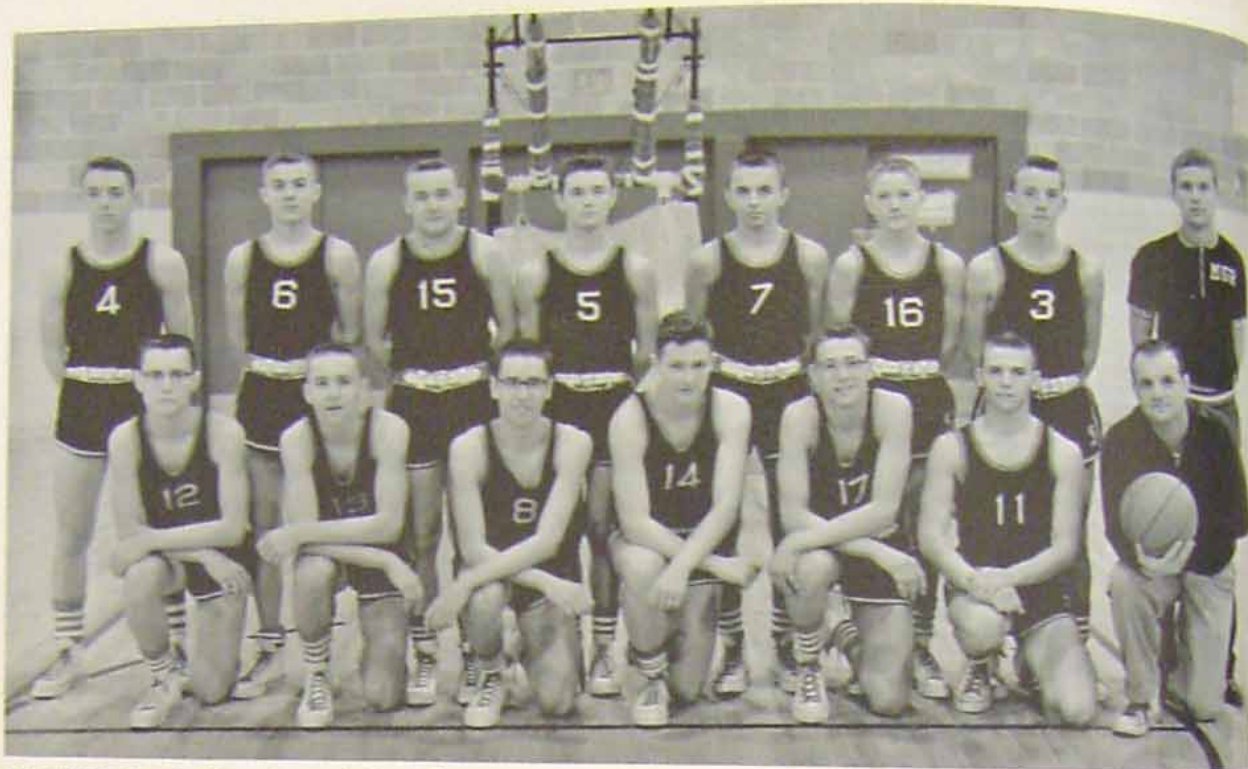

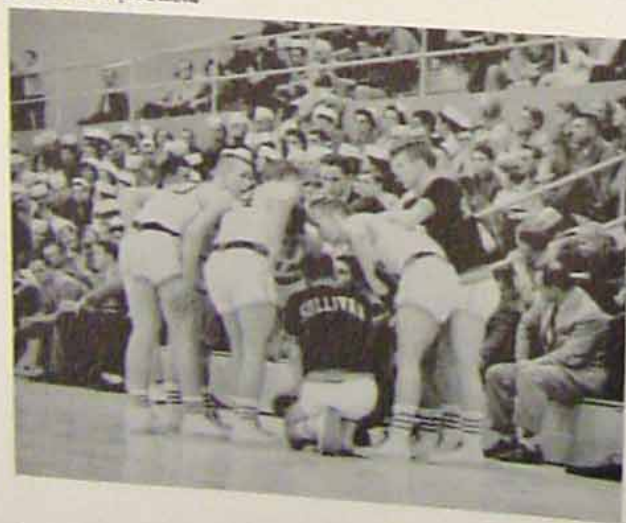

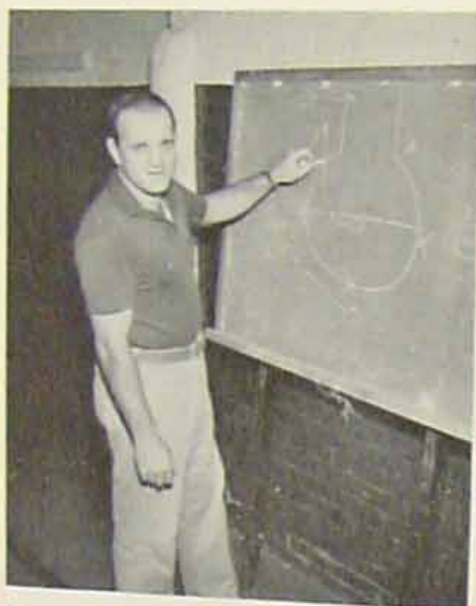

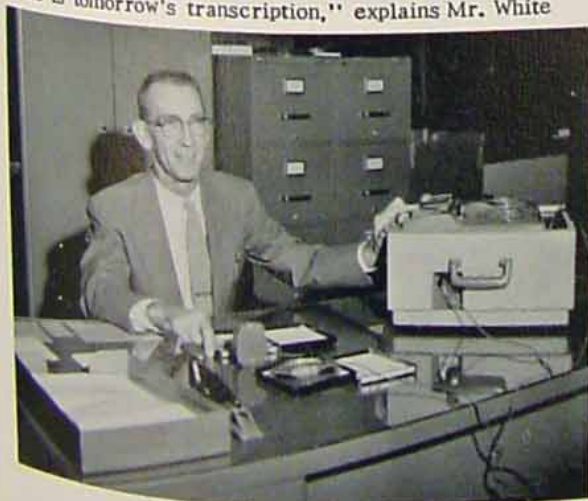

## Council Aids Board In School Problems

School problems are discussed by the Board of Education which in turn sometimes asks for the aid of the Citizens Advisory Council to help get ideas and information to and from the community.

The Unit Board of Education, made up of seven prominent men from the district, analyze the problems presented by the operation of the schools of the district and make the decisions. As their meetings went by this year, they frequently talked about the new high school building being erected north of the old building. In addition to matters concerning construction, they were also considering possibilities for an expanded curriculum when the new facilities come into use.

Members of the community, nominated by their neighbors and named by the Board of Education, give their service on the Advisory Council as a civic responsibility. In general, the members of the Council concern themselves with matters of community interest in the schools. Topics discussed at their meetings this year included surveys of the teaching of science, English, mathematics, social studies, and other curriculum areas in the Sullivan schools.

Several members of the board attended meetings of the Illinois Association of School Boards; and Dr. Dean McLaughlin, chairman of the Advisory Council, also served on a similar state group. Both groups are working constantly to improve our educational system.

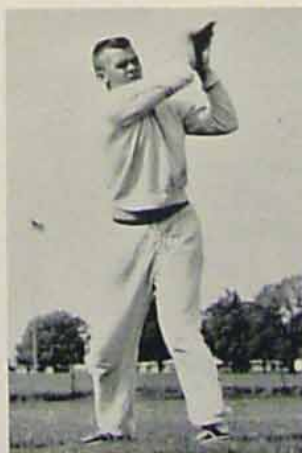

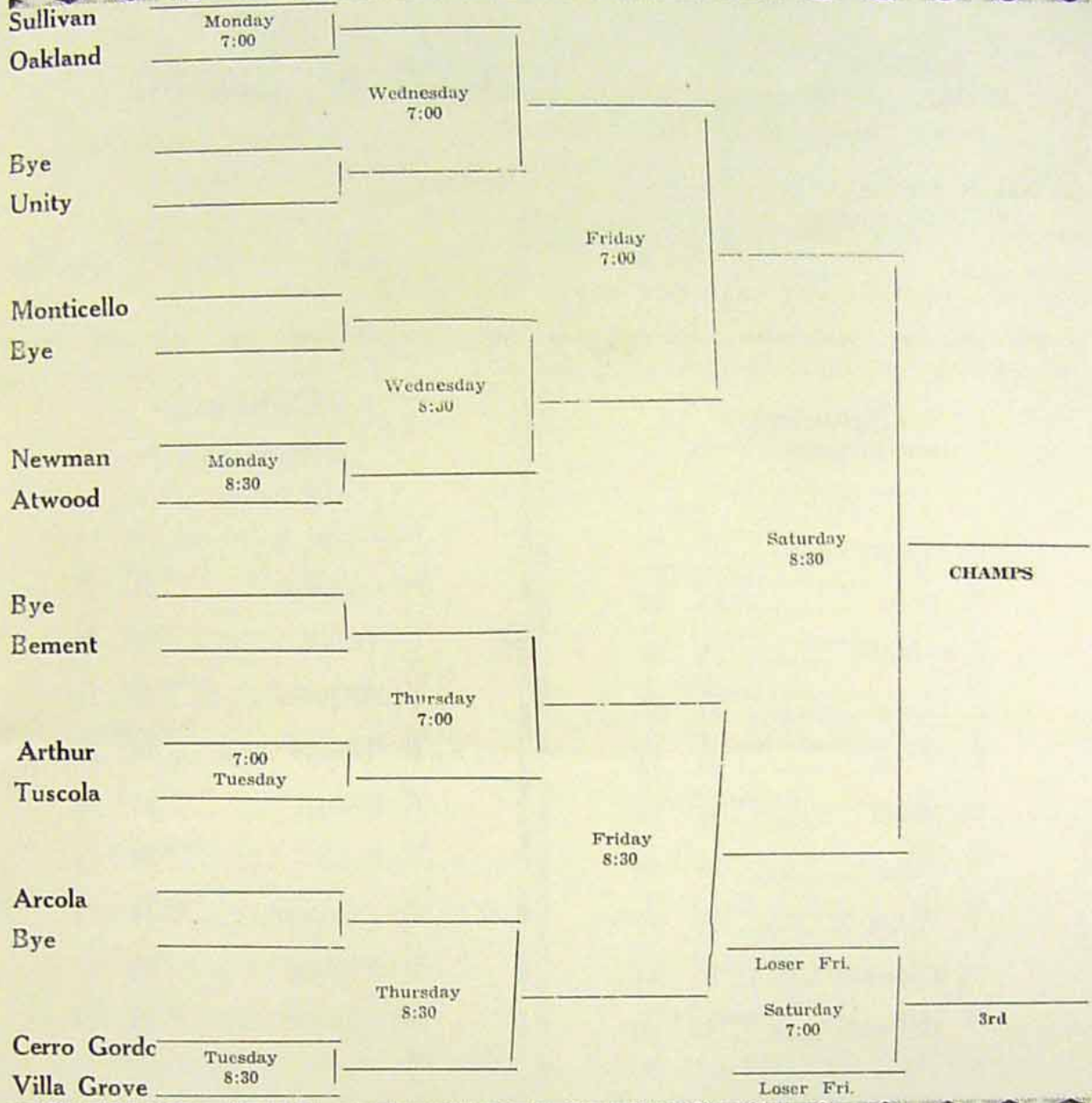
