The reunion is held every year on the second Sunday in July.

- 1. Delia Waggoner, first child of Simeon and Della Waggoner was born in 1893 and died in infancy.
- 2. Edna Cora Waggoner, second child of Simeon and Della Waggoner, was born September 25, 1894 in Osceola, Nebraska and died on November 8, 1971 in Wenatchee, Washington. She was living in Chelan with her parents and working as a waitress in a restaurant when she met LeRoy Shelton Easley, born on September 19, 1891 in Kirksville, Missouri. They were married on September 24, 1913 in Waterville, Washington. LeRoy died January 8, 1964. They had three children: (1) Elma Sloam, (2) William and (3) Elva.

They lived for a number of years at Howard Flat near Chelan where their three children were born. They moved to Oroville, Washington where they were in the orchard business for many years. They sold their orchard and moved to Wenatchee where Roy bought and operated a tavern for awhile until he retired.

After his death Edna continued living in their home on Chelan Street in Wenatchee, enjoying her family and grandchildren until she became ill.

Her daughter, Elva relates that her mother was a very active member of the Ellivora R-bakal, Lodge, She was one of the ladies who started the Theta Rho Girls Club in Okanogan Valley and the one at Oroville which is still very active. She never worked out but was always a good mother, wife and civic worker. Sh. did all kinds of crait work and left many pieces of her work to her children.

One of her granddaughters remembers that she was always understanding, had a listening ear for the

children and took things calmly. She too remembers her grandmother's crocheting, knitting, rug making, etc. and that her home was always neat, clean and comfortable and the large garden that her grandmother always had and how much she enjoyed eating the vegetables from it.

Another granddaughter remembers that she was a wonderful lady who never said an unkind word about anyone. She would voice her opinion on things but felt that everyone was entitled to make their own decisions. She loved her grandchildren and they were always welcome at her house.

(1) Elma Sloam Easley, first child of Edna Cora Waggoner and LeRoy Easley, was born on July 18, 1914 in Chelan, Washington and died in Hampton, Virginia on August 6, 1974 and is buried in Winthrop, Washington. She lived in Chelan until her parents moved to Oroville, Washington. She quit high school and on May 19, 1934 she married Kenneth Delbert Fickes who was born in Newberg, Oregon on May 11, 1911. He died in 1967 and is also buried in Winthrop, Washington. They had one daughter, Karen.

Elma and Kenny made their home in Okanogan until 1947 when they moved to Winthrop. Kenny was working for the U.S. Government, Department of Agriculture, Forestry Department. Elma worked as a telephone operator, waitress and butcher. After Kenny retired in 1966, they moved to Medical Lake, Washington where they both worked at Lakeland Village, a home for retarded children. After Kenny's death, Elma continued living there for a few years and continued her work as an attendant at the home. She visited her daughter, Karen and husband in Wiesbaden, Germany where he was serving with the U.S. Army.

Her health wasn't good and after breaking her hip in a fall, she lived with her daughter in Victorville, California for about a year and moved with them to Hampton, Virginia when Karen's husband was transferred and that is where she passed away.

Elma liked homemaking and was very good at sewing, knitting and crocheting as was her mother and she also loved working in her flower garden. She was an active member of the Rebekah Lodge for many years and it was a very important part of her life.

Karen Fickes, the only child of Elma Sloam Easley and Kenny Fickes, was born in Omak, Washington on January 14, 1944. On August 31, 1963 she married Noel (Butch) Meireis who was born in Clearfield, Utah on March 10, 1944. They had three children: Butch Arthur, Andre and Sheryl Ann.

When Karen was three years old, the family moved to Winthrop and she graduated from high school there.

Noel was in the U.S. Air Force and was stationed at Seattle, Washington but after their marriage he was transferred to Anchorage, Alaska from 1964 to 1967. While they were living there Karen worked for a title insurance company. From Anchorage, Noel was transferred to Sacramento from 1967 to 1968 and then to Wiesbaden, Germany from 1968 to 1971. He was then sent to Victorville, California from 1971 to 1972 and then to Hampton, Virginia for three years and then to Dayton, Ohio where they now live. Noel will be graduating from college soon. His job in the Air Force is an industrial engineer. Karen is selling real estate.

Butch Arthur Meireis, first child of Karen Fickes and Noel Meireis was born in Anchorage, Alaska on September 27, 1966.

Andre Meireis, second child of Karen Fickes and Butch Meireis, was born in Wiesbaden, Germany and died in infancy.

Sheryl Ann Meireis, third child of Karen Fickes and Butch Meireis, was born in Victorville, California on August 11, 1971.

(2) William LeRoy Easley (Bill), second child and only son of Edna Cora Waggoner and LeRoy Easley, was born on November 15, 1918 in Chelan, Washington and died on August 31, 1957 in Wenatchee, Washington and is buried there as are his parents. On August 7, 1948 in Wenatchee, Washington he married Fostina Hain who was born on October 30, 1922 in Dennison, Iowa. They had three children: Vicki Lee, Debra Anne, and Darlene Kaye.

Bill went to school in Oroville, Washington and joined the Army Air Corps in 1935. He attended a Cooks and Bakers School in Monterey, California and later was stationed at Whidby Island in Washington. As an Army Reserve TechSgt he served in Texas and in Burma. After the war he returned to Oroville and later moved to Wenatchee and cooked at the Columbia Hotel.

After his marriage in 1948 in Wenatchee, they moved to Oroville and he had an orchard there. They moved back to Wenatchee in 1953 and Bill worked as a meat cutter at the Pacific Market.

Debra Anne Wasley, second child of William (Bill) LeRoy Easley and Fostina Hain, was born on May 2, 1951 when her parents lived in Oroville. She lives and works in Los Angeles.

Darlene Kaye Easley, third child of William (Bill) LeRoy Easley and Fostina Hain, was born on August 13, 1955 in Wenatchee, Washington. She also lives in southern California and graduated from college there in 1977.

(3) Elva Isabelle Easley, third child of Edna Cora Waggoner and LeRoy Easley, was born on May 21, 1920 in Chelan, Washington. In Okanogan on November 15, 1941 she was married to Leonard James Tedrow who was born on April 30, 1921 in Manson, Washington. They have two children: Raymond William and Sandra Lee.

Elva attended school in Oroville. After their marriage, she and Leonard lived in Seattle for a year while he worked at Boeing Airfield. They moved back to Oroville and she continued living there while Leonard was serving his country during World War II. Upon his return, he did contract logging which took them many places in Washington, California, Idaho and Montana.

In 1965 they moved to Wenatchee and Leonard started working in construction on the Rocky Reach Dam. For the past seven years he has worked for the Pack River Lumber Company at Peshatin as a log scaler. Elva has worked at J. C. Penny Company for eleven years.

Raymond William Tedrow, first child of Elva Isabelle Easley and Leonard Tedrow, was born in Omak, Washington on October 28, 1946. He works for the Pack River Lumber Company at Ardenvoir.

Bessie moved to Washington with her parents when she was four years old. She met Tom when she was cooking for the wheat harvest workers in Mansfield, Washington where he was also working. After they were married, they lived for a time with her parents at Pateros where their daughter, Billie, was born. Later they lived at Brewster where he cooked at the Brewster Hotel. Many years later after his death, Bess cooked at the same hotel.

They moved to Waterville, Washington where he
had relatives. Their
daughter, Ida, was born
there in 1917 and Tom was
killed in 1918. After his
death, Bess and both her
daughters lived with her
parents on Paradise Hill
above Brewster. When the
girls started school she
had a house on Paradise
Hill near her sister
Jessie and family. She
waited on tables at Gamble's

Mill cookhouse. She and the girls also lived with her parents when they had a ranch at Winthrop and then on the Big Bend area near Brewster.

After Bessie Mae's daughters were married, she cooked at the Lakeview Hotel in Chelan and was living with her daughter, Ida, when she became ill and died a short time later. She is buried with her parents in the grave-yard on Paradise Hill.

(1) Billie Bessie Burke, first child of Bessie Mae Waggoner and Tom Burke, was born in Pateros on April 12, 1915. She married Everett Fagg in Okanogan, Washington on May 8, 1931. Everett was born on August 8, 1901. They had three children: James Harold, Marvin and Marlene.

After their marriage they lived in Brewster and later moved to Chelan and Billie and the children lived there while Everett worked at the Howe Sound Mine at the head of Lake Chelan for four years. They moved to Entiat for a short time and then to Wenatchee where Everett worked for Wells and Wade, a large hardware store for three years. Then to Peshastin where he worked in an orchard for eight years. Back to Wenatchee and they bought a home in East Wenatchee. Everett went back to work for Wells and Wade and worked there for twenty years, retiring on June 29, 1975.

Billie has worked at Welch's Fruit Company for the last four years. They just recently sold their home and are now living in a mobile home park in Wenatchee.

James Harold Fagg, first child of Billie Bessie Burke and Everett Fagg, was born in Brewster, Washington on January 24, 1932. James was drowned at Rock Island Dam near Wenatchee on May 30, 1958. In August 1951 at Moses Lake, Washington he married Lila Bowden. No other information available. They had one son, Donovan Lind (Donny) born in July 1952 at Moses Lake. Lila remarried and Donny attended school in Seattle. We were unable to get any other information about Donny except that he is married, has two children, and lives somewhere in the Seattle area.

Marvin Fagg, second child of Billie Bessie Burke and Everett Fagg, was born in Brewster, Washington on September 24, 1934. He married Doris Marts and they had two children: Leoma, born July 20, 1961 in Omak, Washington and Lisa, born on July 23, 1964 in Pendleton, Oregon.

Marvin and Doris were divorced and the girls have been living with their mother in Omak.

Marvin Fagg's second wife was Julie Maureen Weaver and they were married on April 23, 1967 in Wenatchee. They had two children and are now divorced. Their daughters are Julie Annette, born December 16, 1967 in Wenatchee and Marlie Lynette, born on May 23, 1969 in Wenatchee.

Marvin Fagg then married Sharon Diane Balterton on November 11, 1970 in Wenatchee. Sharon was born on August 19, 1941 in Wenatchee. Marvin has two stepdaughters, Tina and Pam, and he and Sharon have a son, Marvin, Jr. born on June 5, 1973 in Wenatchee.

Marvin was in the U.S. Army from 1953 to 1957 in California, Texas and then to Germany and France for three years. After the war, he lived most of the time in the Wenatchee area and has been working as a truck driver there for a number of years.

Marlene Fagg, only daughter and third child of Billie Bessie Burke and Everett Fagg, was born on April 2, 1937 in Brewster, Washington. On January 18, 1957 she married John Fortune in Wenatchee, Washington. He was born on December 23, 1938 in Gilliam, Arkansas. They have two children: Tammy was born on March 15, 1958 and Johnny on March 13, 1959. Both were born in Wenatchee.

Marlene Fagg was married previously to Carl Gregory and they had one daughter, Terrie Lynn.

Marlene and John Fortune have lived in the Seattle area for a number of years and have their own business, the Fortune Roofing Company.

Terrie Lynn Gregory, only child of Marlene Fagg and Carl Gregory, was born in Wenatchee, Washington on April 24, 1956. She married Donald Akin, Jr. in Wenatchee on September 10, 1974. They have a daughter, Toni Lynn, born on July 9, 1975 in Edmonds, Washington. Terrie and Donald are now divorced.

(2) Ida Mae Burke, second child of Bessie Mae Waggoner and Tom Burke, was born in Waterville, Washington on November 10, 1917. She married Lawrence Riddall and they had five children: Blaine Norman, Raymond Lyman, Delores, Harold Frank and Delbert Duane.

During Ida's marriage to Lawrence the family lived mostly at Chelan where they had met when Ida's mother, Bess, was cooking at the Lakeview Hotel.

After Lawrence's death, Ida married Harry Charles Hamilton on January 5, 1961 in Summer, Washington. Harry was born on June 22, 1908 in Maddock, North Dakota.

Blaine Norman Riddall, first child of Ida Mae Burke and Lawrence Riddall, was born on August 7, 1935 in Chelan, Washington. In 1957 he married Donna Doud. They had a son Donald, born Nov. 8,1957. They are now divorced.

Raymond Lyman Riddall, second child of Ida Mae Burke and Lawrence Riddall, was born on February 20, 1937 in Brewster, Washington. He married and had a son, James but he didn't wish to furnish any information for this history. It is known that he has worked as a dental technician in Washington, Oregon and California and was last known to be living in California.

Delores Riddall, only daughter and third child of Ida Mae Burke and Lawrence Riddall, was born in Chelan, Washington on May 10, 1938. She was married to Vernie Jacke who was born on November 10, 1934 in Lawton, Oklahoma. They have lived in Roswell, New Mexico since their marriage and have no children.

Harold Frank Riddall, fourth child of Ida Mae Burke and Lawrence Riddall, was born on March 6, 1942 in Wenatchee, Washington. He married Alena Decker and they had three children: Timothy, born on June 5, 1966; Thomas, born December 8, 1968; and Teddy, born in January 1970. We understand that Harold has four other children but we were unable to get any further information other than that he and his family are living in Washington.



Jessie's history as written by her daughter, Bernice (Clizbe) Weihermiller: "My own dear mother came west with her family as a baby and lived many places while she was growing up. She worked hard as a young girl and we have a picture of her at age sixteen as a cook for a wheat harvesting crew. Cooking was a learning experience for mother most of her life because she cooked for logging crews and construction workers after her marriage. She cooked with no recourse to a cookbook so we have none of her favorite recipes except for a date pudding recipe with only ingredients listed and no procedure to follow. As cooking was an important part of mother's life, so it is to me, my daughters and granddaughter, but we need to consult a cookbook.

Her talent for sewing was inherited by her daughter Thelma and grand-daughter Kathy. Mother and her sister Edna sewed for the large family so she learned early and continued it for many years, making many beautiful things, sewing, knitting and crocheting for her daughters and grandchildren. One of my clearest memories is of her sitting up late, making something that Thelma and I wanted for a particular event the next day.

During one period of her life she sewed for other people. The times I remember best were when we went to Dan Gamble's home in Brewster for 2 or 3 days while she did their mending, making over and sewing new things. Thelma and I enjoyed going there because the Gambles had a parrot, and the raspberries were usually ripe when we were there. We were told to pick all we wanted, which we did!

Mother met my father at a dance on Paradise Hill where so many of the early settlers were to meet their mates. My father's people, the Lessards, were neighbors of the Waggoners. Dad didn't live on Paradise Hill all the time with his family because he preferred logging on the coast where his family had moved from, and working on the steamboats on the Columbia River.

When they were married in Okanogan, they were accompanied by my Aunt Bea, Dad's sister, and the marriage took two days, processing the license, the wait, and then the bad train schedule between Okanogan and Brewster.

After their marriage, they lived on Paradise Hill where my father did contract logging for Gamble's Mill, and I was born in 1917 in a house near the mill. We later moved to Brewster for about 3 years and then back to Paradise Hill in time for me to start the first grade. While my parents lived in Brewster, they joined the Rebekah and Odd Fellow lodges and were members for the rest of their lives.

We lived at the old Root's Mill former cookhouse and I walked some distance to school. When I was in the 4th grade we moved back to Brewster where we lived until a few years after I graduated from high school in 1935.

My father logged for Gamble's Mill for 12 years, and then had his own logging business at Methow, Chelan and Cle Elum. Mother was the bookkeeper, cooked for the logging crews and ran innumerable errands. She was a good listener for his many ideas, plans and dreams.

hair cut that mother had been giving us. When the tape was removed, very painfully, it left a white spot across our noses and cheeks which promptly sunburned along with our ears as a result of their being exposed by the new hair cuts. We were two miserable little girls.

I attended my first four years of school in the County school on Paradise Hill, and my sister went there for three years. The teacher had to build the fire in the pot-bellied stove, get the boys to carry in wood from the woodshed and carry water from the creek nearby. All the grades were in one room, and when it was time for a certain grade to "recite" we went to the front of the room and sat on a bench near the teacher. My first grade teacher had signs and a dunce hat which some poor unfortunates had to wear. I can't remember wearing the dunce hat and sitting in the corner but I do vividly remember wearing a sign "Cry Baby" and having to stand in front of the room until I could quit crying which took some time. It's hard to believe that this procedure did much to help the children's problems.

After we moved to Brewster we still spent our summers in the logging camps. I recall the thrill of seeing the bands of wild horses coming out of the hills to drink at our logging horses' watering trough; meeting, on one of our walks, the Basque sheepherder, with his large band of sheep, who told us of his life in Spain; and finding an abondoned cabin where we enjoyed looking at old magazines that were stacked in the corner.

I attended school in Brewster from the 4th grade until I graduated from high school in 1935 except for the two years when we lived in Twisp. I attended Washington State University at Pullman for one year while my parents lived at Grand Coulee. Over the years I have attended colleges at Napa, California; Angwin, California; Ashland, Oregon; and Humboldt State College at Arcata, California but never finished the last quarter for graduation.

When I worked for my parents at Holden, I met Vern Johnson who was working at the Howe Sound Mine. After our marriage in 1938, we lived for one winter at my parents' construction camp near the mine. The camp had to close down during the winter due to the heavy snow. That winter it was 11 feet deep, we ate frozen eggs and potatoes, and there was daylight for only a few hours a day because of the high mountains surrounding us. We later moved to Chelan, Seattle and Moses Lake where we leased a service station and where our daughter Sharon Ann was born. We separated when she was $1\frac{1}{2}$ years old and Sharon and I moved to Dunsmuir, California to live with my parents. Vern and I were divorced two years later.

When Sharon was in the 1st grade we were living with my parents at Smith River, California and I was working in the office for my father's sawmill company, Crag Lumber Company. Two years later I married Bob Stanhurst and we moved to his home town, Brookings, Oregon where he had returned after being in the Navy during the war. Sharon started the third grade there and was adopted by Bob. We were in the Croft Lily bulb business in Brookings and later at Smith River. After 17 years of marriage, we were divorced in February of 1966.

I married Wayne Weihermiller in 1969 and we live in Richland, Washington where Wayne is an engineer with Battelle Northwest Research and Development Company.

Sharon Ann, only child of Bernice (Clizbe) Lessard and Vern Johnson, was born in Wenatchee, Washington on February 10, 1941. She attended grade school at Smith River, California and Brookings, Oregon and graduated from high school in 1959.

After graduation, she attended Heald's Business College in San Francisco for several months and then moved to Tacoma, Washington where she worked for

the Rhodes Department store in their advertising department. She later married Gary Garrison who was born in Tacoma on April 21, 1939. They have two children: Tamera Lynn (Tammy) born on April 26, 1961 and Jeffrey Arthur (Jeff) born on December 31, 1962. Both were born in Tacoma.

Gary worked in the log export business and for the past several years has had his own company, Cascade Timber Company. They have lived at Steilacoom, outside of Tacoma, for the past eight years.

Sherry works part-time as a bookkeeper for the St. Rita Catholic Church and is active in the American Business Woman's Association. Presently she is attending Fort Steilacoom College taking accounting and related courses.

Tammy's interests are cooking, hiking and the young people's group at the Presbyterian Church.

Jeff likes all sports, especially tennis, and is on the tennis team at his school.

The family home is located on the bay and they own a large boat from which the whole family derives much enjoyment from weekend trips.

Norma Lynn Stanhurst, only child of Bernice (Clizbe) Lessard and Bob Stanhurst, was born in Crescent City, California on October 8, 1956. She attended grade school in Smith River, high school in Crescent City, two years of Junior College at Eureka, California and now lives in Belmont, California and attends San Francisco State University.

(2) Thelma Carol Lessard, second daughter of Jessie Una Waggoner and Edmond Lessard, was born on October 14, 1918 in Wenatchee, Washington. On June 30, 1944 in Arizona she married Russell Kraus. He was born on December 29, 1915 in Detroit, Michigan. They had two children: Russell Bernhardt (Russ) and Katherine Jessica (Kathy).

The Ima attended school in Twisp and Brewster, Washington. Later she lived in Hazel Creek, California where her parents had a sawmill. She next moved to Seattle, Washington to work. From there she enlisted in the first increment of the Women's Army Corps from July 1942 to March 1945. She served several places and was a recruiting officer for some time and traveled a lot. Paradise Hill is a real place, the first place I can remember and, as far as I knew then, the only place in the world. The last time I was there, long ago, we went to bury my Grandmother Waggoner in the little Hill Cemetery; but the time I best like to remember was in the late 1920's.

We lived in the "main" house of an abandoned sawmill; a lovely, old weathered frame house, surrounded by rampant berry bushes - raspberry, blackberry, gooseberry -- lovingly planted by some earlier occupant. An enormous sweep of lawn lay between the house and the old mill; no one ever cut it; the horses and other animals we had from time to time kept it cropped down.

There was no electricity then on Paracise Hill; kerosene lamps and gasoline lanterns provided light. The lamps burned from wicks and gave off flickering rays (if turned up too high they smoked and blackened the glass chimneys), but lantern light came from two "mantles" and was bright and steady. The mantles were tiny pink mesh bags with draw strings that fitted over gas outlets; when installed they were carefully lighted with a match and allowed to char, making them very fragile. Lanterns were known to explode and were considered too dangerous to use except for reading or figuring. We had a telephone, a massive thing that fastened to the wall, which was activated by a hand crank. It was possible to make calls directly by turning the crank in assigned patterns - one long and two short rings, for example - but most had to be placed through the operator whom everyone knew and called by her first name, Doris.

My father was a logging contractor supplying the only functioning sawmill on the Hill. Teams of horses were used for moving logs within the woods, but his true love was his five hard-rubber tired trucks. They were lined up on the lawn each evening, facing the house, and my father, tool box in tow, would roll under the first, inspect it carefully, tighten a bolt here and there, and roll on to the next until all five were examined and judged to be in fine condition. He was only twenty-five or twenty-six years old at the time, but was already a man with his own business employing ten or twelve men, and the trucks were the most conspicuous evidence of his achievement.

One time, my Grandfather Lessard came for several months, during which

he taught my sister and me some French words and phrases, such as how to say "please pass the potatoes". He also devised a little game, born of desperation, which involved timing us on his big pocket watch to see who could be quiet the longest. He had ten children of his own, and well knew the value of such stratagems; we were adults and he long dead before we were conscious of having been manipulated.

Paradise Hill is in the foothills of the eastern slope of the Cascade Mountains in the state of Washington. In the 1920's it was the back end of nowhere, accessible only by a one lane dirt road. On its sandy loam soil, great stands of white pine and Douglas fir grew straight to the sky. Our home was surrounded by the forest, which marched up the slopes as far as the eye could see. The difficulty of access to this beautiful land seemed to attract unusual characters; we never knew how they came, or when they went - suddenly one was there, and then he was gone. A cherub of a man with white hair and fluffy beard appeared one day in the abandoned mill, repaired and set up the old grindstone, and overnight, was in the axesharpening business. A courtly old gentleman, he was invited to dinner with us on several occasions. The first time, when the jam dish was passed to him he set it on his plate and ate the entire contents. We laughed, later, thinking he had mistaken it for dessert, but he repeated the performance at each meal, and we were never able to decide what it meant, or why he did it. A few weeks passed, and he, too, was gone, one of many unexplained spirits that wandered briefly through my childhood.

While my father loved mechanical things, my mother's weakness was musical instruments. She had not had an opportunity to learn to play one earlier in life, and had a childlike confidence that - given just the right instrument, she could play it perfectly, and at once. As a result, a number of unusual instruments came to our house, remaining only long enough for my mother to realize that each one required time and diligence, then was given away or moved up to the attic. I remember one she awaited with particular eagerness - a sort of combination guitar and violin which sat on her lap and was plucked at one end and played with a bow at the other. I believe I remember that one because it made such a dreadful cacophony of unrelated sounds. Once she went too far and bought a piano, which is a difficult object to give away or to get up to the attic; she was stuck with it - or worse - my sister and I were stuck with it, for years of lessons and countless hours of practice.

The time of these events was very long ago; I understand a few members of some of the old families - the Raleighs, the Gillespies, the Winslows - still live in the area, but their first names do not challenge the imagination like Clack, or Reney, or Lacey, or others that I remember; they lived in the golden time of my childhood in a place called "Paradise Hill."

After their marriage, they lived on Paradise Hill for three years and then moved to Entiat, Washington where they had a ranch on the Entiat River. They later moved into Entiat and Ralph worked as a meat cutter and then to Leavenworth where he had the same job.

Their next move was to Richmond, California where they remained for the

next five years. They built a new home and Ralph worked for the Standard Oil Company. They returned to Brewster, lived on Harmony Heights, several places on Paradise Hill and Ralph worked hauling logs for Ed Lessard and John Ward. Later he worked as a truck driver for Gamble's Mill for 17 years.

They moved to Monse, Washington, which is near Brewster, and Grace worked for the U. S. post office for ten years before her death in 1949. She is buried at the Omak Memorial Cemetery in Omak, Washington. While they were living at Monse, Ralph drove the school bus to Brewster and worked as a meat cutter at one of the stores during the day.

He taught his son Vern how to cut meat and later he took over his dad's job.

After Grace's death, Ralph married Opal Jensen and they have lived at Carlton, in the Methow Valley, for a number of years near his son Vern and wife Mary and his grandchildren.

(1) La Verne (Vern) North, first child of Grace Laura Waggoner and Ralph North, was born in Brewster, Washington on December 31, 1917. He married Mary Schneider on October 30, 1941 in Okanogan, Washington. She was born on April 1, 1919 in Winnipeg, Manitoba. They have four children: Sharon Rae, Joan Marie, John Aley and Sabina Grace.

Vern was in the U.S. Army from April 1941 until he was discharged on July 15, 1945. During that time he was in Vancouver, Washington, King City, California and Fort Lewis, Washington as well as with the U.S. Army Engineers in White Horse, Canada for nine months working on the Alcan Highway. While in Alaska, he was also stationed at Kodiak, Adak and the Aleutian Islands. From there he went to Browning, Texas, Vero Beach and was discharged at Fort Lewis, Washington.

After his years in the military, Vern came back to Omak, Washington where he worked in the woods and then on to Grand Ronde, Oregon. The next 7½ years were spent in Brewster where he worked as a butcher for Homeowned Grocery and then to Roseburg, Oregon where he worked for five years at Douglas Lumber Company. The North's next move was to Milwaukee, Wisconsin where they lived for thirteen years and Vern worked for American Motors. Since 1970 they have lived in Carlton, Washington and he is employed by Mumma Trucking in Brewster.

Sharon Rae North, first child of La Verne North and Mary Schneider, was born on June 5, 1942 in Portland, Oregon. She married Charles Philip John Wilging on July 1, 1961 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. He was born on October 27, 1932 in Milwaukee and is now a policeman there. They have four children: Michael Charles, born January 22, 1962; Joseph John, born on November 20, 1962; Lori Ann, born on March 8, 1964; Tim Ronald, born on January 28, 1969. All were born in Milwaukee.

Joan Marie North, second child of La Verne North and Mary Schneider, was born on August 15, 1946 in McMinnville, Oregon. She married Charles P. Jansen on July 8, 1966 in Carlton, Washington. He was born on March 6, 1947 in Monse, Washington. He is employed as a millwright by Crown Zellerbach in Twisp, Washington and they have three children: Sara Le Anna, born August 2, 1968 in Ft. Irwin, California; Alex Richard, born December 20, 1970 in Brewster; and Jenny Marie, born on March 5, 1976 in Brewster.

John Aley North, third child of La Verne North and Mary Schneider, was born on August 25, 1950 in Brewster, Washington and was killed on June 10, 1969 in Vietnam where he served for only three months.

Sabina Grace North, fourth child of La Verne North and Mary Schneider, was born on September 7, 1955 in Roseburg, Oregon. She is married to Paul Cecil Darwood who was born on October 28, 1953 in Brewster, Washington. They live in Twisp, Washington where he drives a skid cat for the Crown Zellerbach Timber Company. They have one son, Wesley Paul, born February 12, 1977 in Omak, Washington.

(2) Edward (Ed) Barrett North, second child of Grace Laura Waggoner and Ralph North, was born on July 30, 1919 in Brief, Washington. He married Audrey May Baldwin on May 11, 1946 in Republic, Washington. She was born on October 3, 1928. They have six children: Thomas E., Robert Alan, Julia Anne, Michael, Jean and Ralph.

Ed joined the U.S. Navy in January 1941 and served as a seaman both in the Pacific and the Atlantic. Later he was a hospital corpsman. He served on the U.S.S. Savannah and was discharged in 1945.

Ed and Audrey lived in Omak, Chelan and moved to Glide, Oregon in 1951 where they are presently living. Ed is a truck driver and works for the Roseburg Lumber Company. They have always attended the Waggoner family reunion every year since it started in 1970.

Thomas E. North, first child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born on May 22, 1947 in Omak, Washington. He was married to Sonja C. Leggett and they had a daughter, Cheri Noel, born on December 11, 1967 in Roseburg, Oregon. They were later divorced. On April 25, 1970 Thomas married Jeannette A. Smith in Glide, Oregon. She was born on October 2, 1947 and was killed in a drowning accident on May 19, 1977 in Roseburg, Oregon.

Thomas served two years in the U.S. Army including a year in Vietnam where he became a sergeant E-5. He received a purple heart, a bronze star, an army commendation and two air medals.

He presently lives in Glide, Oregon and is working as a sawyer at U.S. Plywood in Roseburg where he has been employed for the last six years.

Robert (Bud) Alan North, second child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born on May 23, 1949 in Chelan, Washington. He is unmarried,

lives in Glide, Oregon and is attending college, studying to be an engineer.

Julia (Julie) Anne North, third child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born on February 28, 1951 in Chelan, Washington. She was married to Gary LeRoy Holcomb and they had a son Jamie Lee, born on May 5, 1969 in Roseburg, Oregon. They were later divorced. On June 12, 1971 Julia Anne married James (Jim) Hammer in Carlton, Washington. They have two children: Julian James, born on January 22, 1973 and Joseph Edward, born on July 13, 1976. Both were born in Brewster, Washington.

Julia's husband Jim works for the U.S. Forest Service in Winthrop, Washington. He works on trails in the Pasayten wilderness and camps out with a crew for most of the summer.

Michael (Mike) North, fourth child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born on May 28, 1956 in Roseburg, Oregon, He is unmarried and lives in Glide, Oregon.

Jean North, fifth child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born in Roseburg, Oregon on August 17, 1963 and lives with her parents in Glide.

Ralph North, sixth child of Edward North and Audrey May Baldwin, was born in Roseburg, Oregon on September 4, 1965 and lives with his parents in Glide.

(3) Norman Norton North, third child of Grace Laura Waggoner and Ralph Norton North, was born on July 10, 1926 in Richmond, California. He married Gwen Lucille Spencer on August 19, 1945 in Yuma, Arizona. She was born on October 19, 1924 in Canute, Okalahoma. Their first daughter was born on December 24, 1946 but died on December 25, 1946. They have five other daughters: Pamela Sue, Cynthia Lea, Debra Lynn, Sheila Gail and Valerie Gwen.

Norman was in the U.S. Navy from January 1943 until February 1946 and was at Farragut, Idaho for his training before going to Treasure Island, San Francisco. He was later sent to Tasmania, Austrialia, Egypt, through the Suez Canal and was in the Mediterranean during the Sicily invasion. He returned to the U.S. going to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania before traveling to Iceland, Scotland, England and then back to New York. He than went to Hawaii and took part in the Saipan invasion. He also went to the Marrianna Islands and then back to Honolulu, Brisbane, Australia and New Guinea. Norman was with the 7th Fleet during his time in the Pacific.

After the war, he and Gwen lived in Everett, Washington where he owned and managed a grocery store. During the last 17 years they have lived in Brewster and he has been a truck driver for Mumma Trucking.

Pamela Sue North, second child of Norman Norton North and Gwen Lucille Spencer, was born on January 7, 1948 in Wenatchee, Washington. She married William Clayton (Bill) Gagne on June 26, 1970 in San Diego, California. He was born on February 25, 1948 in Concord, New Hampshire. They have two sons: William Armand, born on January 31, 1971 in Plymouth, New Hampshire and Brad Richard, born on November 8, 1971 in Franklin, New Hampshire.

After their marriage they moved to Bristol, New Hampshire and lived there until August 1974 when they returned to Brewster for a time before moving to Okanogan in 1975. They now live in Omak, Washington where Bill works at a Safeway store.

Cynthia (Cindi) Lea North, third child of Norman Norton North and Gwen Lucille Spencer, was born on February 22, 1949 in Leavenworth, Washington. She married James Glenn Elliott on October 7, 1967 in Dryden, Washington. James was born on May 8, 1950 in Cleburne, Texas. They have one daughter, Angela Glenn, born on May 23, 1968 in Wenatchee, Washington.

Cynthia and James lived in Cashmere, Washington where he attended school. They spent three years in Wenatchee where Jim worked for Alcoa, and three years in Portland, Oregon where he was a funeral director and Cindi worked as a dental receptionist. They moved to Tigard, Oregon where he attended college and she again worked in a dentist's office. Before moving to Omak, Washington where they are presently living, they spent a year in Searcy, Arkansas where they both attended college. Jim works for the Crown Zellerbach Timber Company. He is still going to college as is Cindi.

Debra (Debbie) Lynn North, fourth child of Norman Norton North and Gwen Lucille Spencer, was born on June 10, 1952 in Everett, Washington. She married Joel Kirk in 1971. He was born on March 9, 1950 in Brewster, Washington. They have two children: Douglas, born on May 7, 1972 and John, born on June 14, 1974. Both were born in Brewster.

Debbie and Joel lived in Brewster until moving to Electric City, Washington for a short time and then to Grand Coulee where Joel worked on the Grand Coulee Dam. During the last six months of their stay there, Debbie worked for an optometrist. They are now living in Brewster and Joel is employed by an electrical contractor as a journeyman electrician at Grand Coulee Dam.

Sheila Gail North, fifth child of Norman Norton North and Gwen Lucille Spencer, was born on March 31, 1955 in Everett, Washington. She married David Martin Bushbom on March 27, 1976 in Searcy, Arkansas. David was born on May 13, 1955 in Marshalltown, Iowa. They have one child, Ian Martin, born on November 13, 1976 in Marshalltown, Iowa.

Their marriage ceremony was performed by her sister's husband, James Glenn Elliott, in a little chapel at Harding College. They live in State Center, Iowa and Dave is employed at Lennox.

They were living in Twisp when their son was born and later lived for about five years on John Ward's place on Paradise Hill. They moved to Brewster, built a home and Isobel operated a Variety store. They were living there when they were divorced.

George Milton and his second wife Ella Opal lived at Omak after their marriage and he built houses and sold them. He operated an orchard along

Duck Lake road, was a carpenter, and at the time of his death, was president of the Duck Lake Water User's Association. He was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

George was accidentally killed by a tractor overturning on him and severely crushing his chest. He was building a home on top of a hill and was clearing rocks from the yard when the trailer on the tractor pulled it over a 35 foot embankment. His wife lived for a number of years after his death in one of the houses that he had built but has since moved to Arkansas, her former home.

(1) Glenn George Waggoner, only son of George Milton Waggoner and Isobel Mae McFaden, was born on September 12, 1927 in Twisp, Washington. He was killed in a tractor accident when only seven years old on July 17, 1934 when the family was living on Paradise

- 7. Ralph Waggoner, seventh child of Simeon and Della Waggoner, was born in Chelan, Washington on April 15, 1904. He died of tuberculosis at age 20 in 1924. He is buried at the cemetery on Paradise Hill.
- 8. Guy Waggoner, eighth child of Simeon and Della Waggoner, was born on October 15, 1906 in Chelan, Washington. On February 18, 1925 in Okanogan, Washington he married Caroline Julia (Frieda) Raymond who was born on April 4, 1902 in Kettle Falls, Washington. He was the first of the Waggoner boys who were to marry the Raymond girls and they had six children: (1) Irma Lucetta, (2) Evelyn, (3) Frieda May, (4) Guy, Jr. (Dick), (5) Frances Vera and (6) Karen June.

Guy and his family were raising wheat on the Colville Indian reservation north of Brewster when he met Frieda. They operated a wheat and cattle ranch on the reservation for 30 years. He also started driving truck at age seventeen and has continued ever since. His son-in-law Ray Mumma bought his first truck from Guy in 1947, a 1947 Reo and from this start the Mumma Trucking Company grew and Guy drove for them in his spare time. When Guy sold the ranch in 1959 he continued driving truck for the Mumma Company whenever they needed him and at times he was a regular driver.

Guy and Frieda celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1975 and their children held a party for them in the Grange Hall in Brewster with

150 people attending to wish them well, have refreshments and dance.

They have been going to Yuma, Arizona for the winter months for the past ten years and stay at the Palm Garden Estates mobile home park.

Carol Mae has lived in Brewster area all her life. She cooked at the
