CHARLES REEDER GIVES INTERESTING ACCOUNT OF TRIP TO THE WEST.

Charles Reeder, who returned on August 31st from a tour of a few weeks to the west, gives the following account of his trip:
I left here on Tuesday, July 25th, for Chicago. I left Chicago at 11 a. m. on the same date over the Burlington route for St. Paul, Minn. This was an all day's ride and it was very warm although I enjoyed myself very much through the state of Wisconsin, there being many lakes and bluffs along the Mississippi river. I arrived in St. Paul at 10:15 p. m., where I spent the night. The following morning I left St. Paul via the Great Northern railroad for Glacier National Park.

SIX MOULTRIE C. C. YOUTHS MAY RE-ENLIST.

The Illinois emergency relief commission has made inquiry of H. L. Shanks, Red Cross chairman here, if 25 per cent of the reforestation workers from Moultrie county could be re-enlisted for another period of six months.
There are now 27 men from this county in the C. C. C. camps, which number is the full quota for the county. This group will be discharged Dec. 1, and only 25 per cent of the number will be re-enlisted for another six months. This will cut Moultrie county down to only six men.
