DECLARES TRADE BARRIERS FORCE FARM CHANGES. Vast readjustments which American agriculture, and particularly farming in a state like Illinois, faces as a result of European trade barriers are not insurmountable, Dr. Charles L. Stewart, chief in land economics, college of agriculture, University of Illinois, told more than 2,500 attending the annual farm and home week.
