How much is there on your farm? How about the old car body, that rusted cultivator, those old plow bottoms, discarded tools? Every bit helps - and it is needed now.

There's a bumper scrap crop to be harvested this spring — and there's money in it for you. Your scrap dealer will pay for everything usable. You can do three good turns in one scrap harvest:

- 3. If you can't drive it in, call your scrap dealer and ask him to pick it up.
- 4. If there is no scrap dealer near you, call your implement dealer. Ask him how to get your scrap started toward the steel furnaces.


STRAWBERRY GROWING TIP

This new way of growing straw berries is found to save labor, space and produce larger berries. Early in the spring as soon as your strawberries in your old patch are large enough to transplant, remove the plants with soil around the roots and plant your new rows where you are going to have tomatoes. On soil high in fertility, place your berry rows three feet apart and the plants twelve inches apart in the row. When it is time to plant tomatoes place them in will make your tomatoes and strawberry rows 18 inches apart. When hoeing the weeds out of your tomatoes you will keep the berries clean.

In July when your tomatoes cover the ground you will feel you have done the wrong thing. Don't worry about the strawberries. They like it and will take care of themselves. Leave the tomatoes on the patch after the frost kills the vines and throw a few leaves or straw over them.

The following spring remove the old vines and leaves and you will have a nice thinpatch of berries.
