I living in a twelve by sixteen log house, straw-roofed, etc, plenty to eat and collee and water to drink; nary drop of anything stronger. I am live ing on antelope, deer, and elk, and plenty of rabbits, called jackase rabbits, and will weigh from six to ten pounds. I have plenty of ponies and attle, and sell a good deal of game to the coldiers at fort Laramie and Fort Walbeck-avarage 15 cents per pound—and have to pay \$20 per sack of 100 hs of flour, 30 ets a pound for bacon, 50 cts a pound for salt, 40 cents a pound for crackers, etc. I have been visiting at Cherry creek, and Pike's Peak—also, South Platte Gold diggings—and it beats all cre-ation; plenty of Indians and whites mixed up with half-breeds, Greasers and Pike county men. Nothing to eat but buffalo—and no gold. All that can get away are leaving, and the ballance have bought squaws and will stay till spring if they dont freeze before. I could have hired three hundred men for their board. In the spring I shall visit the States, and buy me a stock of Indian's goods, and open a trading post on the South Platte at the Santa Fe crossing, and live in the country, take me a squaw and go into trade. I've made all my arrangements, and as soon as the weather permits shall start for the States—about the middle of March. It will take six weeks to go from here to the Missouri river; so by the last of April I hope to be in Chicago, God
