The Last Ally.

The Black Republican papers and their adjuncts have been amusing themselves for some time with certain letters written by a person sign-ing himself "Gen. Ogilvle Byron Young," and dated at Cape Girardeau, in this State. Such a man is believed to have an existence, and as the intention in the publication of the letters from him—for they always appear first in Black Republican paers-is to injure Judge Douglas, it is well enough to let the public know who he is. This is done, to some extent, by the Memphis Avalanche, a paper that has no love for Mr. Douglas. This man Young, then claiming to be a doctor, and not a general, as now, appeared in May, 1857, at the farm of Mr. E. M. Legrand, a wealthy and highly respectable gentleman in Desha county; Arkansas, and there was the cause of discord between Mr. L. and his overseer, which resulted in the death of Mr. L. A garbled account of this affair was published in a Memphis paper by this Dr. Young, which so incensed the citizens of Laconia, that they met together and resolved that the presence of this man and his wife disturbed the peace of the neighborhood, and that they must leave. At a subsequent time the people again assembled to conduct the parties to the river, with a negroband in full blast at his heels. "Upon the arrival of the mail boat the doctor was drummed on board, and admonished not to return to Laconia any more." The Avalanche does not state that, upon some disagreement with his wife, she chastised him in the streets of Memphis, but this is understood to be the fact. More recently, the people of New Madrid have been after him, and he has been warned not to go back there again. Mr. S. had always lieen a good Democrat; by taking the office from Mr. Post, his predecessor, and by running as a Danite candidate, he separated himself from all his former associates, and became the ally of Republicans. ) He spent much more than the income of his office in keeping up a newspaper, advocating principles which the entire people held in abhor-rence.
