To propare the seed before sowing take a dish that is large enough to hold all the seed that is intended to be sown, and turn on enough of new milk cover the seed; let it sonk six hour then drain it dry; take sulptur a put on a good quantity, mixing it thoroughly before sowing; the utilk causes the sulpher to adhere to the seed, and as the seed vegetates, the strength of the culpbur impregnates the young plant, that the turnip fly will not molest it.
