Shocking Tragedy in Essex.

The Hopkins Monitor has a lengthy account of the doings of the negroes in Grayson county. Near Kentucky town a man named Kincaid whipped his negro boy. That same night the negro, while all else were asleep, killed the entire family with an ax—first his master, then his mistress, then an orphan boy and a little babe. The negro confessed his guilt, was tried and hung. Several white men were implicated, but nothing definite known. A few days after, three more negroes were hung as implicated in the murder. The bodies of the negroes were not suffered to be removed from the trees, but will hang there as a warning to others.

Douglas and Lincoln.

It has since the sale of Douglas and Lincoln's photographs at the wigwam, transpired that the Republicans had arranged, as they supposed to a certainty to have the sale so conducted that the one of Lincoln should fetch a large sum, and that of Douglas a small one. But it proved that their arrangement was not complete. We are curious, however, to know what they regard as a high figure for these imperial photographs of two representative men. We have pretty good evidence that, after all their planning for effects, it was determined not to run the Lincoln up above \$50; they supposed, of course that the Douglas would not—as no efforts to that end were made—bring anything like that sum. When the \$50 were offered for the Douglas the Republicans by necessity bid \$75 for the Lincoln; but, so astonished were they at this turn of the thing, that after the picture was knocked down nobody came forward to claim it.—It was announced in the crowd that the Press and Tribune folks were the bidders; we so stated yesterday. We understand, however, that neither the Press and Tribune nor any other party has yet claimed it. The bidding was, it seems, a piece of deception—though we, of course, acquit the directors of the concert of all blame. It is not necessary to say that the gentleman to whom the picture of Douglas was struck off, at once claimed it and cheerfully paid his \$100 for it. This, it may be objected, a small matter, but it is not too small to interest the general reader, as it excited a large part of this community. But to show that the Republicans are painfully exercised in this regard it only needs to be stated that they were yesterday busily employed in arranging matters for an offset to this photograph business. They propose to have sold at auction, to-night at McVicker's theatre, a copy of Volks bust of Douglas and Lincoln respectively. It is well known that our most spirited Democrats have already started for Baltimore, and that probably, it would be easier for the Lincolnites to compete in bidding, in these circumstances, than in any other. But still they are unwilling to risk it in a fair competition. All day yesterday drummers were around begging subscriptions from Republicans with money—declaring that to redeem the credit of the party they must "raise the wind" and place Lincoln's bust above that of Douglas.—And so by subscription, the funds are raised—and if Lincoln's bust is sold, it really will be by subscription and not in any fair sense—any fair sense under the circumstances—at an auction.

The sale of photographs was an ordinary transaction, to start with,—at least, on the part of the friends of Douglas,—but in the excitement of the moment the bidding was spontaneously carried to an unexpected height. It was purely spontaneous, and the result showed how much greater the admiration is even in this Republican city for Douglas than for Lincoln. We have no advice to proffer to the Democrats, as to what course it is proper to pursue to-night for ourselves, however, if, smarting under a sense of their defeat at the Wigwam—where Douglas' photograph brought \$100, and Lincoln's only \$75—the Republicans desire to buy up by subscription, pretending that it is by auction a copy of a bust of their Presidential nominee, at an enormous expense, why, we have not the slightest objection.—Chicago Times, 15th.

Exercise.

We are glad to find that there is a general desire to return to the old, healthy exercise of walking. Walking is always available, and a walk in a cheerful frame of mind with the eyes open for beauty and the air attuned to natural melody, is no despicable gymnastic exercise. Our excessive heat in summer, and excessive cold in winter, gives us a ready excuse for neglecting this exercise.— But if we would know what the true enjoyment of life is, we must learn to walk. We have no lark to tempt us by the exquisite music of his morning hymn, to walk before sunrise, nor nightingale to lure us on our evening rambles the sweet scented violet, the early primrose and the fragrant thorn are absent from our hedgerows and our lanes. Yet I am slow to believe that our friends of the old world have any more out door attractions than we have.

"Principles—Not Men."

"At this coming election the contest is to be for Principles, not men; therefore personal likes or dislikes are to be laid aside for the public weal. We want to place at the head of affairs a man who will effectually and efficiently carry out the needed and salutary measures of the Republican party. Put an incompetent executive at the head of the National Union train; and he will just as probably precipitate it into disunion and ruin.

This is a critical hour in the history of the Republic, when the possession of ordinary abilities, a genial disposition and common honesty are not the only qualifications necessary for the national executive. Above all these are needed broad, national views, which cover the interest and policy of the whole Union; statesmanship of national scope and enlarged experience, and a resolute decision of character; an inflexible purpose, and executive ability of no ordinary proportion. Whether the candidate of the Republican party possesses these, his friends have not told us; certainly he has never exhibited them. His only exhibition while in Congress, consisted in a resolution of inquiry after the particular "spot." And even that he never succeeded in finding.—ILL. STATESMAN.

Definition of Soils.

In common phraseology, soils are characterized by various, and, in many instances, very vague terms, such as heavy, light, stiff, open, tenacious, porous, wet, dry, warm, cold, etc. These always convey some important characteristics, but are differently understood by different persons. Soils are properly classified according to the presence in greater or less proportion, of certain bases, such as clay, lime, sand, and vegetable matter these being important constituents. A Pure Clay—is a soil in which very little sandy silicious matter is found; accurately it consists of a chemical combination of about sixty parts of silica and forty of alumina, with a trace of oxide of iron. A Strong Clay—contains about 20 parts in 108 of sand, capable of separation. A Clay Loam—contains a large proportion of sand, easily separated. A Loam—contains 1-2 or more sand, readily separable. A Sandy Loam—contains 8 or 9-10 sand. A Sandy Soil—contains 1-10 or less of clay. The above are the varieties of soil as regards the base clay. In reference to the second important constituent, lime, we have a marl containing from five to twenty-five per cent of lime. A Calcareous Soil—in which lime is the predominant constituent.—Marls are always characterized as sandy, loamy, or clay marls, according to the portion of sand. In respect to decayed vegetable matter there are soils which owe their character to this. Such are our swamp soils, or muck, in which masses of ferns and the roots of the dead grass predominate, forming a black, fibrous mass. Vegetable or leaf-mold, formed by the decay of leaves, found in our wood lanans, is one of the most valuable items to the gardener. Muck, however, cannot be used with safety in compost with other soils until it has been meliorated by exposure to the sun and air, and admixture of some alkali. I recommend potash, soda lime or magnesia to be the most efficacious alkalies used, and are found in several forms, such as wood ashes, common salt, &c.—The term peat is frequently used in speaking of soils resulting from decayed vegetable matter; the term muck has a very different significance with our English fellow laborers, though the popular phrase with us.—Germantown Telegraph.
