\$400,000 ROAD IMPROVEMENT

Survey Starts Monday

District Engineer Appel Notifies Supt. Little That No Time Will Be Lost in Doing Preliminary Work. Surveyors Start on Job at Bethany. Speed Necessary From Here On.

Letting In June

Right of Way to Be Secured by May 15th. Will be One of The Big Contracts at June Letting. Unreasonable Demands on Part of Property Owners Can Kill Present Plans.

The Sullivan to Bethany to Dalton City section of Route 132 will be built this summer.

There are approximately 14 miles in this section and judging by contractors' bids in recent lettings the approximate cost of the improvement will be \$400,000 or more.

County Superintendent of Highways received word from C. H. Appel, district engineer at Paris, early Saturday morning that surveying will start from Bethany Monday. He was instructed to have a few rod men available to help the surveyors.

Mr. Appel stated that he had instructions from the State Highway Department at Springfield to rush work on this job.

As soon as the survey is completed the department will furnish blue prints showing what right of way dedications are necessary. All of this is to be done by May 15th. The section will then be included in the June contract letting.

If everything works out as planned this road may be completed some time next fall.

There is one big bridge over the West Okaw and several smaller bridges on this section. There is also considerable grading. The total cost of the improvement may be well over \$400,000.

It will give Bethany hard road connections without unnecessary delay. It will give work to many during the summer months.

Furthermore it will add to the hard road mileage of Moultrie county, so in proportion to its size it will be second to none in the state.

Recently difficulties pertaining to location of this road were amicably adjusted. Many Bethany people wanted the road located west of that city to connect with Route 169. They used every effort to get this done. The state did not favor that routing and consequently there were delays in starting work. Director Cleaveland and Chief Engineer Frank Sheets recently met with Bethany folks, but that meeting did not pan out well. County Superintendent of Highways Little and Supervisor F. C. Newbould then presented another plan to Bethany. They asked them to accede to any location that the state might decide on and in return for such action the Board of Supervisors would pass a resolution setting forth that the road from Bethany west to Route 169 would be included in the first construction work that Moultrie county would do with funds realized from the gasoline tax. This proposal met with favor in Bethany. They agreed to accept it if the supervisors passed the resolution. This was done last Tuesday. A copy of the resolution was sent to Director Cleaveland and he notified Mr. Little that immediate action would be taken by his department. He seems to have been as good as his word and his instructions to Mr. Appel have started. The ball a-rolling Bethany and Dalton City will have a direct route to Sullivan their county seat.

As soon as blue prints of right of way reach here the hard road committee of the board of supervisors will get busy to get the right of way. The members of this committee are J. B. Craig Jr., chairman, F. C. Newbould, F. F. Fleming and C. A. Lane. They face the task of getting the right of way without any unnecessary delay.

The exact location of the route from Sullivan to Bethany is uncertain, but Sullivan has promised to support whatever location the state may decide on.

The only thing that can delay the building of the road will be the necessity of starting court proceedings to condemn land for right of way where the owner of same may be unreasonable in his demands.

If everybody is reasonable, if all get behind this project and help the work along, the contract will positively be let in June and dirt will fly shortly thereafter.

This is perhaps the biggest improvement project ever undertaken in Moultrie county and the state highway department pays the bill.

ARTHUR NEEDS A HARD ROAD

Arthur wants hard road connections. It will get its wish when route 133 is built. This is the route located recently from Lovington to Brocton. That section from Arthur eastward to Arcola may be built this year. The state has not signified any intention to let contract on that section from Lovington to Arthur. This is a road of great importance to Arthur and will give it a hard road to the county seat—Sullivan. At hearings in Springfield attended by representatives of the Sullivan Community club, the highway department was urged to heed Arthur's plea for a hard road.

Moultrie county gets its hard roads by staying on the job. Located as we are in east central Illinois, these arterial highways cross the county leading to Decatur, Springfield and other big centers of population.

EDITORIAL

The State Highway Department is ready to give Moultrie County a great improvement. It will build us a permanent hard road and spend nearly a half million dollars in doing so.

There are no ifs or ands about this so far as the state is concerned. It's terms are plain. It can and does make good. One thing necessary is that the Moultrie county hard road committee of the Board of Supervisors secure without delay the right of way for the hard road where the state survey will locate it.

That requires the co-operation of the owners of that right of way. If they are obstinate and unreasonable in their demands for payment on land required, the road will not be built this year. Moultrie county will not be held up. It is reasonable to state that in no case will the damage done exceed the big benefits to be derived. Paying people for building a hard road past their farms is foolish. It is one part of the state road program that permits of selfish exploitation.

Let us hope that all people from whom right of way will be required will be reasonable and will co-operate in the fullest extent.

WANT MARTIN FARM FOR LINCOLN MEMORIAL PARK

J. D. Martin of this city has been served with notice that the State of Illinois has instituted condemnation proceedings to secure his farm of 18 acres south of Mattoon for a Lincoln Memorial park. It was on this 18 acres that Lincoln's parents lived for a time. Lincoln also owned some of this land.

Mr. Martin has asked \$11,000 for this tract. The state has never made him an offer, but instituted proceedings instead. A hearing will be held in Charleston May 5. The interests of the local man are being looked after by Anderson & Son, Charleston attorneys.

STATE DISTRIBUTIVE SCHOOL FUND DELAYED

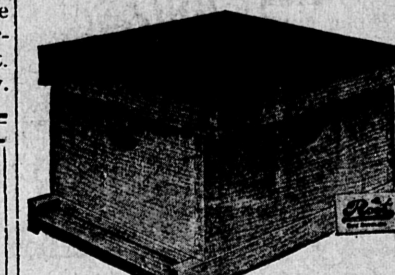

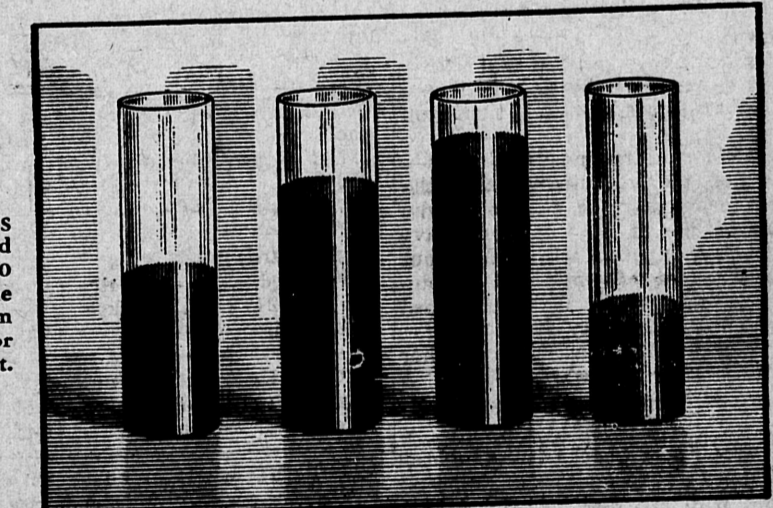

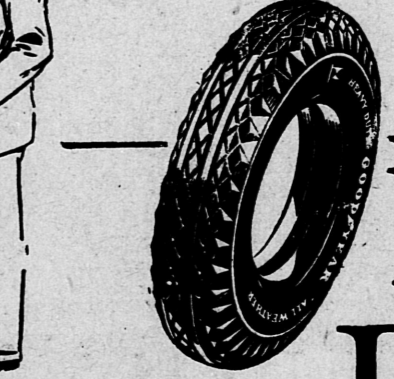

HEALTH WEEK WILL BE OBSERVED HERE IN SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

ing matter be inserted free as its contribution toward the cause of health during Health Week observance:

Who Is Responsible?
It is a peculiar trait of human nature that we seldom take action unless goaded by necessity. It is so in regard to the prevention of smallpox and diphtheria—diseases which annually take thousands of lives and leave thousands of handicapped or disfigured victims. We know what causes these diseases and how they are spread. We have for each an absolutely reliable preventive measure, yet until smallpox of a virulent form appears or an epidemic of diphtheria occurs in a community, we neglect to make practical use of the knowledge we have.

For seven successive years, the United States has had more smallpox reported than any other country in the world, with single exception of India. Last year, more than 100,000 children in the United States suffered from diphtheria. Ten thousand of them died—an average of more than one death for every hour of every day of the year. Coming home to Illinois, there were over 4,000 cases of smallpox reported last year—more than were reported in any other state in the Union and more than among the combined populations of Germany, France, the Netherlands, Belgium, Italy, Poland, Switzerland, the Philippines, and Japan. Last year, there were more cases of diphtheria in Illinois than in any year since 1923.

Children cannot act for themselves in the matter of immunization against disease. Their safeguarding in that respect is one of the obligations of parenthood. Certainly there is no parent today who has not heard of the efficacy of vaccination as a preventive of smallpox. It does not seem probable that any parent today is ignorant of the fact that diphtheria can be prevented by inoculation with toxin-antitoxin. The disease has been wiped out in institutions and communities where immunization has been systematically practiced. If all children between the ages of six months and eight years were protected by toxin-antitoxin diphtheria would disappear within a few years.

The outlook for small pox and diphtheria in Illinois during 1930 is not encouraging. Unless all signs fail, there will be more smallpox than in 1929. Diphtheria moves in cycles and 1930 is indicated as a peak year.
Has your child been vaccinated? Has he been immunized against diphtheria? If not, have him protected and safeguarded against these two scourges which menace his health and life, and save yourself a great deal of worry—perhaps many regrets. Remember the responsibility for the continuance of smallpox and diphtheria rests on you.

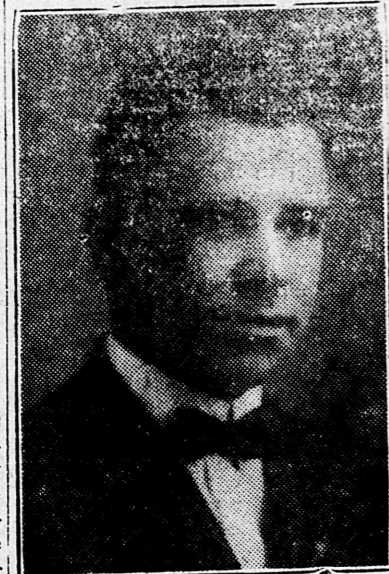

MONTE CRIST TAKEN TO INDIANA; DECATUR RAID CAPTURES SEVEN

places were under observation and confessed, after capture, that they had intended fighting their way out, whenever the officers came.

Much of the loot taken in recent Illinois robberies was found in these Oakland Avenue houses. Some of the guns stolen from the Sullivan Armory were there; some of the things taken from G. W. Bryant's Lovington garage were there. So also were things stolen in robberies and holdups in other counties.

The best known of the toughs was Monte Crist. He is not a stranger in Sullivan, having at various times been in the local jail. He is now paroled from the Joliet penitentiary on sentence imposed on him in another county. Crist is alleged to have been the leader of the gang.

States Attorney Foster and Sheriff Lansden tried to get the captured men to talk and tell what they knew about recent Moultrie robberies, but without success.

In the meantime some of the folks from Jasper, Indiana, where a bank was robbed some weeks ago, came to Decatur. They promptly identified Crist as having been one of the Jasper robbers. They appealed to Gov. Leslie of their home state for a requisition. It was issued. R. B. Foster, acting for the bankers of Indiana presented this requisition to Gov. Emmerson. It was honored. Wednesday morning three carloads of Indiana officials and bankers came to this city. From here they went to Decatur and presented their demand for Crist. He was delivered to them. On their way back to Indiana they stopped off here for a few minutes. They were armed for battle. Crist, a little rat-faced, big eared specimen wore shackles and handcuffs and was sandwiched in the back seat of the middle car between two big heavy-weight officers. They were taking no chances on rescue.

Indiana also wants Clint Brooks. He is in jail here in Sullivan. The Indiana folks are making a fight to get him. The Governor has not yet passed on their plea for Brooks although a hearing in the matter was had last week. Brooks is on parole. That is why Illinois hesitates about surrendering him, although Crist too was a paroled prisoner.

Eddie Murray and Clint Brooks were taken into the circuit court here Thursday morning. No action was taken relative to Brooks, but Murray's trail was set for May 19th.

The men are indicted here for robbing the Gays bank. Both are said to be active in the Crist gang. Several members of this gang are still at large. The officials of Central Illinois are determined to break up the saturnalia of crime which has recently reached such shocking proportions. It is expected that sooner or later information can be gained from the men now in custody that will help gather in others who are part of the organization.
