

Ordinance No. 294

AN ORDINANCE MAKING THE APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR

Section 1—Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Sullivan, Moultrie County, Illinois, that the following sums of money are deemed necessary to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of the said City for the current year, and the following sums and amount for the objects and purposes as hereinafter specified and set forth are hereby appropriated for the current year for the public objects as herein stated for the fiscal year commencing May 10th A. D. 1930, and ending May 9th A. D. 1931.

Section 2. That all unexpended balance of any item or items of any general appropriation made by the Ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items of any appropriation made by this ordinance.
