BRYAN CONLIN DIED FRIDAY IN DECATUR

Bryan Conlin, 76 years old, for 51 years a resident near Dalton City, died in his Decatur home on Friday morning. He had been ill for about three weeks with pneumonia which developed complications.

Mr. Conlin had lived in Decatur about three years since retiring from farming near Dalton City. He was one of the best known residents of that vicinity.

He was born in Columbus, O., March 16, 1854. He married Miss Sarah Reedy near Dalton City Feb. 11, 1877. They would have celebrated their 54th wedding anniversary next month. Mr. Conlin came to Christian county near Taylorville when he was a boy. Later he moved to near Dalton City and farmed in that vicinity for 50 years. He was one of the oldest members of St. Isadore's parish. He was a member of St. Thomas the Apostle Catholic church and the Holy Name society.

He leaves his wife and six children: Mrs. Dennis O'Leary Chicago; Ellen, Sarah, Catherine, Teressa and Loretta all of Decatur. Six children are dead. He leaves 11 grandchildren.
