

Brutally Attacked Dorothy Webb

Ray Abbott Committed Fiendish Crime Early Sunday Morning. Girl Is Recovering. Assailant Returned to Pontiac.

Ray Abbott is in custody charged with the crime of rape, assault o murder, kidnapping and maynem, committed early Sunday morning on the person of Dorothy Webb, aged 11, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charley Webb.

Abbott, who was on parole from the Pontiac reformatory was arrested and lodged in jail early Sunday morning. Later in the day Sheriff Lansden deemed it advisable to take him to Decatur for safe-keeping. Monday morning he was brought back into Moultrie County and given a hearing before Justice of the Peace Lambrecht. He waived the hearing and was put under \$20,000 bond to await the action of the September grand

Parole Officer Lorenz of Decatur then took charge of the prisoner and accompanied by Sheriff Lansden took him back to Pontiac. He will be available there when Moultrie county wants him for trial on the charges against him.
