PAROLED CONVICT BRUTALLY ATTACKED DOROTHY WEBB

(Continued from page 1) dance ended and the couples either went home or went riding. The Webb girls went riding with some friends. Abbott says he followed them for a distance and then turned back. He claims that what happened between that time and his arrest the next morning is a blank for him.

The Webb Family

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Webb and his little daughter Dorothy had, as was their custom, spent Saturday evening in this city. They got home about 11 o'clock. They live on what is known as the Monroe place north of Bruce near the Monroe ford of the Okaw. Upon their return home they and other members of the family retired for the night. In the room where Dorothy, the 11 year old daughter slept, also slept Bunny Webb an uncle of the father.

A Beast in the Night

About 1 o'clock Mrs. Webb was awakened by shrieks from her daughter. She rushed to her aid but was too late and saw a man carrying the little girl out of the house. She recognized the man and his car. The rest of the family was aroused. The alarm was spread. Sheriff Lansden was notified and the man hunt was on. Three posses were organized. Sheriff Halac Lansden and his father deputy Sheriff Charles Lansden began scouring the country near Bruce. Old Kinsel and several Bruce men were watching the roads into Bruce; Charles Webb, Pete Carder, J. Byrom and the oldest Webb daughter in another car were also driving the highways and byways in the hope of finding Abbott and Dorothy.

Sleeping and Unconscious

Two hours later the father and his posse found a car parked alongside the hill road running east from Bruce. When they looked into the car a horrible sight met their eyes. Abbott, still holding the little girl was asleep. The car was bespattered with blood. The floor of the car and the one running board were covered with the clogged life-blood of the fiend's victim. The little girl was unconscious and in the cold of the morning looked half frozen.

Rescued the Victim

The father and sister did not bother about Abbott, but they took the little girl, wrapped her up and hurried home with her, where medical aid was summoned. When the sheriff was reached with the information, he went and took the sleeping beast into custody and brought him to Sullivan. Not only had he raped his victim, but he had beaten her over the head with a pump jack and with a pair of pliers. She was badly beaten, showing that she had put up a hard fight. She had been bitten on parts of her body and a tip of one finger was bitten off. Stitches were necessary to close her scalp wounds.

Turned Out by Parole Board

Ray Abbott is a son of Lil Abbott who in her later days was Mrs. Sherman Miller. She died some years ago. Ray made his home with Ed Abbott near Bruce. He was generally regarded as shiftless and undependable, although his past crimes have been of a pifering nature. He broke into a store at Bruce some years ago and stole a lot of miscellaneous articles, for many of which he could have not possible use. He was also mixed up in auto thefts and finally got into court where a one to ten years sentence was administered and he was sent to the Pontiac reformatory. He is said to be about 21 years of age. After serving a few months at the reformatory, a kind-hearted parole board again turned him loose on the community.

Latest reports say that Dorothy Webb will recover from the effects of her horrible experience. The Sheriff is anxious to get the bootlegger who sold Abbott the liquor that made him a raving beast. The community feels that this bootlegger is equally guilty with Abbott in the most dastardly crime ever committed in Moultrie county.

The minutes of the special April meeting were read by the Clerk and there being no objections or corrections said minutes to stand approved as read.

The following resolution was offered by F. C. Newbould of Sullivan township:

WHEREAS, a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Moultrie County, Illinois, was held on the 29th day of April A. D. 1925 at which there were present C. A. Lane, Walter Wiser, A. L. Mayfield, and G. D. Edmonds each of whom had heretofore been elected to the office of Supervisor in their respective townships, and

WHEREAS, each of said persons aforesaid presented a certificate of election which was duly examined by the committee on credentials and was found to be regular and ordered to be placed on file with the Clerk of the Board in the office of the County Clerk of said county, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the action of said Committee in examining said certificates of election of the new members above named and finding them regular and approving them and now on file, be and the same is hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

On motion by F. F. Fleming, seconded by John G. Albright the above resolution was adopted as read and it was so ordered by the Board.

Frank Parkinson Auld, M. D. of Shelbyville, Illinois, District Health Superintendent, discussed the public health situation in district and urged each member of Board to work in bringing about better conditions in their townships.

Board adjourned to 1:30 p. m. to go into Committee work.
