### Rainey Tells of Russia

Congressman Henry T. Rainey of Carrollton spent several months in Russia this past summer. He was investigat- der to him, assistants fill it and he over and when possible send their washing your face? ing Russian conditions and seemed very favorably impressed.

What is Russia doing? A plenty. Here are some of the basic facts as set forth by Congressman Rainey in an address before the Illinois Editorial Association at Champaign Friday night.

In the revolution of 1917 the Czar and the old order of O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, which killest the prophets, things in Russia was done away with and a socialistic form velopment.

All lands, all property of any kind and character were thy and the religious orders lost all they had. The government then proceeded to organize its activities so that all residents of Russia should share equally in the wealth and that grinds them out, packed into production of that immense country. All work and all devel. little tubes of twenty, labeled and opment in Russia\*is in conformance to that plan.

Every man and woman in Russia has work at fair wages. They are housed in government houses, treated by gov ernment doctors and dentists. Children are cared for in government nurseries while mothers work. Everybody in Russia gets a two-weeks vacation on full pay, this even includes the inmates of penitentiaries and reformatories. Mr. Rainey was especially impressed with the way in which criminals are handled in Russia. They are put to work and taught trades.

He reports that nowhere on earth has he found "such enthusiasm, such loyalty to government and so much stupidity" as in Russia.

America is what is termed a "a capitalistic nation." That means that the rights in property of the individual citizen are protected by law. The opportunity exists for getting immensely wealthy. That is one of its questionable features. That is one condition that no longer exists in Russia. Statistics show that in 1929 thirty-six American millionaires had a larger income than 450,000 American wage earners. Many people in America, even in times of depression have incomes of \$1,000,000 or more a year, while hundreds a lease and go about one's usual of thousands are out of work and hungry.
