CHILDREN'S HEALTH AND HAPPINESS RATHER THAN TRADITIONAL THREE R'S. Regardless of the amount of book learning any one may have, if they do not have the "Two H's", Health and Happiness the education alone will never carry them very far. If we are interested in children, either our own or other children we naturally will do all for their future health and happiness. Diphtheria is considered a children's disease. Diphtheria is a very dangerous and contagious disease of the throat and nose; can cause a weakened heart, or cause heart failure. Or diphtheria may leave it's victim paralyzed and too, in many cases a dangerous throat operation is necessary to help the child breathe. Diphtheria causes the death of many children, especially under five years. DIPH-THERIA POSITIVELY can be prevented. It is necessary for us to know the children's age for Toxoid is given to children 6 months to eight years; Toxin-Anti-toxin is given from eight years on. During the war our soldiers were immunized and did not have Diphtheria. However, nearly everyone that survives the 'teen age' builds up this immunity against Diphtheria in a perfectly natural way. There will be no cost for these treatments and they WILL NOT harm your child or children. Bring them to the clinic and have them protected against this dangerous disease. You can never tell when Diphtheria may break out in your school, the child that sits next to yours may develop Diphtheria which means that your child is exposed, and too, can bring this disease to the rest of the family. Remember: give your child's full name and age and parent's signature. Treatments are: Toxoid - six months to 8 years old, in three hypodermic doses, three weeks apart. Toxin-Antitoxin - 8 years on to adult age, three does hypodermically each a week apart. Then, six months from the last treatment you can be absolutely certain that your child is fully protected by the Schick Test. This treatment will not cost the parents one cent at these clinics. The Community or Townships around the nearest place mentioned will be the clinic for you to attend. Every one must be sure to have their children's names and ages in soon, and to be at the place at the time set for Clinic. According to ages, each treatment calls for three doses and MUST be at the time set for each place.
