

Cars Wrecked On Route 133, Near Beachy Crossing

A little before six o'clock Wednesday night of last week there was a bad auto wreck on Route 133, just west of the Beachy crossing near Arthur.

Mrs. Clifford Davis and her daughter Frances and Mrs. Ross Thomas were on their way home after having spent the afternoon in Arthur.

The emergency brake on the Davis car was partly set and after driving across the railroad crossing smoke and fire began pouring from beneath the car.

Mrs. Davis, who was driving the big Paige, stopped the car to put out the fire. In the excitement of the moment she did not think to run the car off of the pavement. Just as she started to get back into the car, she looked up and saw another car from the east bear down on her. She jumped back just in time to save her life. The oncoming car crashed into the rear end of the Paige. It was a C. I. P. S. company car being driven by a man named Bowers who was on his way to Lovington to do some work. He stated later that he did not see the Davis car until he hit it.

The front end of the C. I. P. S. car, a Chevrolet delivery truck, was smashed beyond recognition. The windshield was broken and the steering wheel was shattered.

RAW vs. PASTURIZED MILK

Vehement arguments about the merits and demerits of raw and pasteurized milk during the last few years have led the U. S. Public Health Service to embark on a voyage of peace making or at least to elect itself as an arbitrator or umpire of the facts in the case. To settle the argument it chose the old reliable procedure known as the "test" of the pudding is in the eating thereof.

Accordingly arrangements were made to weigh, measure and take the histories of several thousand children in some forty cities located in a dozen different states. Those children who had received raw milk for at least one-half of their lives were put into one class and those who had received no milk which had been heated were put into another class. These children ranged from 2 to 6 years old. The records of 3,358 children were studied.

It was found that children who had received only heated (pasteurized, boiled, dried, evaporated or cooked) milk were slightly heavier in proportion to height than the children who had received raw milk. The difference, however, was regarded as insignificant, the average weight being 33.6 and 33.2 pounds respectively for the groups.

Scarlet Fever Record
Of much greater importance was the scarlet fever histories of these children. The scarlet fever rate among children who had received raw milk was nearly twice that of the children who had received only heated milk. The rates per 1,000 of the two groups respectively were 23.0 and 41.4. The diphtheria and rickets rates were also higher among children in the raw milk group.—Illinois Health Messenger.

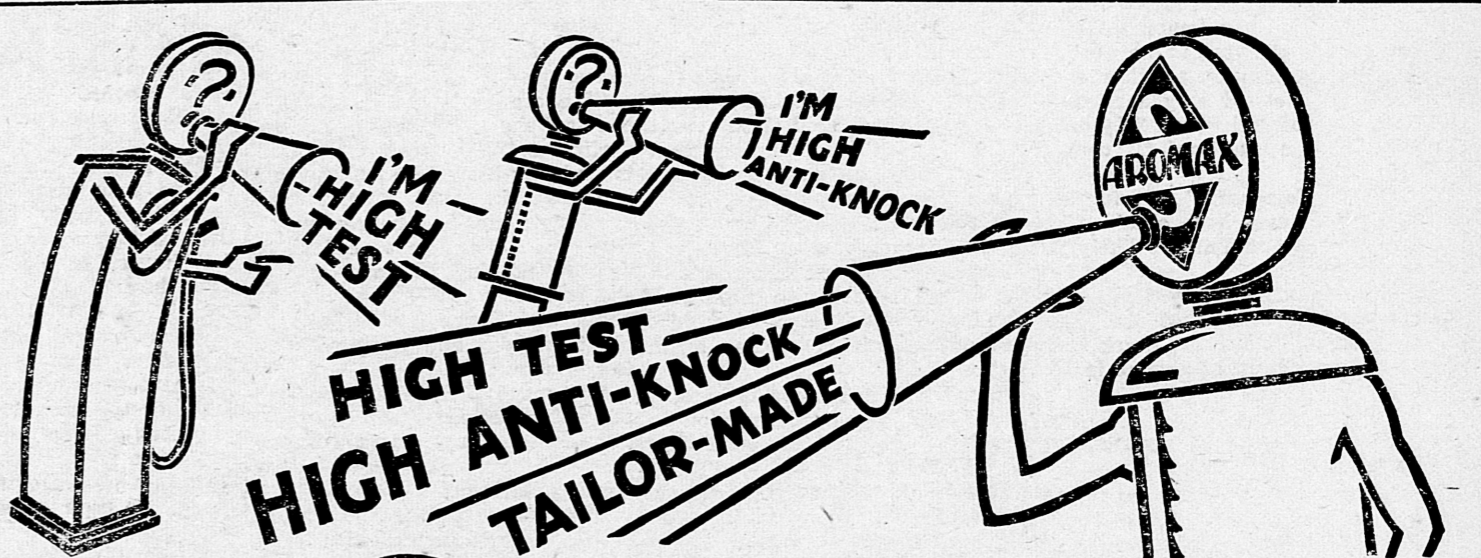
