#### Reclaiming a Great State Office.

On that November day in 1930 when the people of Illi nois elected Edward J. Barrett state treasurer, they broke the heart of a vicious gang of financial pirates which had been a festering sore on the state for many years.

The state treasurer's office was a great graft for a select circle of financiers. It was the heart and soul of the dominating clique which ran affairs at Springfield. It was a closed corporation, a select group and others vainly struggled to wrest control of the office from them
