

Abraham Lincoln --- A Man Among Men.

I have lately read a book that partially revised my longestablished mental picture of Abraham Lincoln. It tended to make Lincoln more of a man, less of a demi-god.

During his life-time Lincoln was not regarded as great. Some of his associates, such as Seward and Stanton regarded him as an uncultured boor from the wild prairies of Illinois. They deemed it unfortunate that Lincoln should have been elected president and decided that they would take the task of running the nation out of his hands.

That myth, of the unlettered, log-cabin born, rail-split ting Illinoian had penetrated into the far east and the learned statesmen were sorry indeed that the fortunes of politics should have made him president.

In my past estimate of Lincoln, there was always a period of years to which I had given but scant attentionthose years between the time when Abe Lincoln clerked in the store at New Salem, fought in the Blackhawk war, told tall stories, loved lots of girls, and the time when the people decided in convention in Chicago that he was a big enough man to be president of these United States.

The facts seem to be that during these years Lincoln accumulated knowledge and experience that at the time of his nomination easily made him the oustanding member of the bar in Illinois. Besides his reputation as a lawyer he had also won his spurs as an astute politician. He had made his mark. He has shown signs of clear thinking and good common sense. His nomination was not an accident but was the wise choice of men who knew exactly what they were doing.

Perhaps, to give this sketch a spiritual angle, God had during these years prepared him for a great task. But Lincoln the president would never have been great, had not Lincoln the man been so predominantly human, so much a part of the day and its troubles in which he lived.

Abraham Lincoln went to Washington at a time when civil strife was impending. Times were not good, but that did not bother people so much as did the question "What is this the head and shoulders. country anyway? AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 295 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SULLIVAN, ILLINOIS, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO MOTOR VE-HICLES, REGULATING TRAF-FIC AND PARKING OF VE-Game 5-Findlay 15; Steward- HICLES, AND THE OPERATION THEREOF UPON THE STREETS ILLINOIS:"

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SULLIVAN, ILLINOIS:

That Section 48 of Ordinance No. 295 of the revised ordinances of the City of Sullivan, Passed, July 21st A. D. 1930, Approved July 21st, 1930 and Published July 25th, 1930, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SECTION 48:-

Parking on that portion of Main Street, Jefferson Street, Washington Street and Harrison Street where said streets surround the Court House square, in said City, vehicles shall be allowed to park as

be parked on both sides of said streets only and at an angle to the curb, and no double parking will be permitted on any of the streets of the said City of Sullivan.

A producer is allowed to sell 300 pounds of pork products each marketing year without being liable for processing tax, effective as of November 5, 1933. The first marketing year with respect to hogs covers the period November 5, 1933 to Nov. 5, 1934.

mals slaughtered, with the excepttion of the portions retained for his own family use. Under this new ruling received

recently from the Secretary of Agriculture, the average producer who butchers for his own use and disposes of surplus products, such as lard, sausage, etc., will be exempt from processing tax.
