Final reports on canvass of the Democratic Legislative vote in Champaign county shows that E. E. Sturdyvin won by a majority of 279 votes over Brandenburg.

Brandenburger's majority over Sturdyvin in Moultrie was 2923; in Piatt it was 1416, or a total of 4339 in these two counties.

Reports show that in four Piatt precincts and in several Moultrie precincts the judges and clerks counted only 2 votes on the legislative race instead of 3.
