

Willianm Lorimer And Charley White.

William A. Lorimer died last week. There was a time when he was a big man. He was chosen United States Senator by the Illinois Legislature at a time before those officials were chosen by direct vote of the people.

He was at that time the Republican boss of Chicago and of Illinois. Democratic legislators voted for him. His election resulted after a long deadlock. Money was used to buy votes for him. Democrats sold their votes; so did Republi-

All of this happened in 1910. A man named Charley White was much in the public eye at that time. I knew Charunion. He had little education, but he did have plenty of friends, especially among union labor. He received the Democratic nomination and was elected.

Charley White, up to the time he went to Springfield, was, apparently, an honest man. He was single. He roomed and boarded with a woman of Irish ancestry in the city of
